

# SPRAGUE'S ATTACK ON PICKETING BILL BRINGS ARGUMENT

Supporters Predict Action Will Gain Labor Votes—Martin's Friends Say Farmers Will Go to Hess

SALEM, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Supporters of the gubernatorial nominees had a hard time figuring out today what would be the effect of the attack of Charles A. Sprague, Republican candidate, against the initiative measure to restrict picketing and boycotting. Sprague supporters predicted that the action would win thousands of labor votes that otherwise would have gone to Henry L. Hess, Democratic candidate who also opposes the bill. Since last Sunday's editorial was published in Sprague's newspaper, the Oregon Statesman, the Portland and Salem labor councils have voted down motions to endorse Hess.

**Martin Friends Ired**  
Friends of Governor Martin, who chooses to take no part in the campaign, were angered at Sprague's stand against the bill, since the governor is for it. They predicted that many farmers who favor the bill would switch over to Hess.

"This will make the farmers sore," one person close to Martin said. "Even though Hess is also against the bill, the farmers probably will vote for him, because farmers do mighty queer things when they are mad."

The editorial, while asserting the labor initiative was a step in the right direction, termed the bill to drastic. It said the measure would prevent an AFL craft union from calling a strike, since the bill provides that a majority of all workers in any one industrial plant must consent. It also charged that the bill was in conflict with the Wagner labor relations act.

**Party Split Holds**  
Another major campaign development was Sprague's appeal for votes that went to Governor Martin in his losing battle in the Democratic primary against Hess.

so claim an easy victory, arguing that many Republican labor union members will vote for Hess.

**Ikkes, Martin Old Foes**  
Governor Martin did not attack Secretary of the Interior Ikkes, leaving that to Sprague, who termed Ikkes a "meddler." Ikkes, on his visit to Bonneville, called Sprague a "man with one foot in the grave and one on a banana peel."

The governor felt he did not need to say anything, since Ikkes did not mention the governor, Ikkes and Martin have been bitter enemies since 1933.

**Oppose Building Plan**  
There has been some opposition to the proposed new building in the capitol group, to be constructed thru funds of the industrial accident

commission. These funds would be repaid by rentals paid by offices which would occupy the structure.

The opposition has come from some employers who have paid money into the fund, these persons arguing that the fund is a sacred trust to be reserved for benefits to workers who have been injured and to widows of workers killed in industry.

Many state officials, however, are for the building because, in reality, it wouldn't cost the state anything and it would place all state offices here in state-owned buildings. They say the accident fund wouldn't actually be spent, since it would be repaid with interest.

# NORTHWEST GIVEN VAST PWA SUM IN RECENT SPENDING

Approximately Twenty Million Gone Into Construction Since Program Began in June — More Slated

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Since launching its spending program last June, the public works administration has poured approximately \$20,000,000 into the Pacific northwest states for construction. Public works records here disclose that on October 11 the administration had approved 254 projects in Washington, Oregon and Idaho, having a total construction cost of \$41,505,367 and involving federal grants of \$18,676,215 and loans of \$22,829,152. Of the 254 projects, 121 were in Oregon, 75 in Washington and 58 in Idaho.

**Washington Gets Most**  
Washington, however, received the lion's share of the allotments—\$12,855,450 in grants for projects costing an estimated \$29,569,266. Oregon grants totaled \$3,744,711 and loans \$624,000. The total estimated cost of the 121 projects was placed at \$8,322,647 by PWA officials. Idaho's share in the PWA program on October 11 totaled \$2,076,954 in grants and \$197,000 in loans for work estimated to cost \$4,613,454.
