SONS AND WOLVES MEET IN ANNUAL CLASSIC TONIGHT

Invading Monmouth Eleven Boasts Backfield Averaging Near 200 Pounds—Game On Ashland Grid

A huge Oregon Normal school football machine, boasting a crushing power attack to compliment its usual screwball offensive maneuvers, provides the homecoming game competition for the SONS of Coach Jean Eberhart tonight at Ashland, with the opening kickoff slated for 8:00 o'clock sharp under the lights of the high school field.

Winners over the SONS, 19 to 6, at Monmouth last week-end, Coach Al Cox's 200-pound gang of bruisers enter the game decided favorites to make it two in a row. However, the Southern Oregon Normal school mentor said today that his club, at practically full strength, was fired to the sky for the game, and that an upset was not impossible.

Hill Will Play

Eberhart also announced that Jack Hill, last year's Medford high speedster, would see plenty of action at the right halfback berth, although he would not open the game.

With a backfield that average close to 200 pounds per man, and a line that goes over that figure, the Wolves from Monmouth figure to have terrific power at the lighter SONS, in addition to displaying their famous grid hocus pocus, developed by those twin quarterbacks crouched behind center. The Wolves are paced by Left Halfback Jesse, a line-cracking, speed-burning maniac who has run the heels off opponents all season.

The SONS, with a 168-pound line and a 177-pound, lightning-fast backfield, will counter Monmouth power and deception with a sparkling running and forward-passing attack, built around Nig DiSordi, left halfback, and Fullback Jack Hudson. DiSordi, 190 pounds, is the second fastest man on the squad, and a brilliant aerial pitcher. With all the backs and both ends being fine receivers, Eberhart intimated that his team might shoot for victory through the ether.

Sons Tackles Huge

The SONS boast the two largest tackles of any college in the state. Harry Johnson, right tackle, weighs 300 pounds, and Ken LaBranch, at the other tackle, weighs the Fairbanks at a mere 225.

Ashland's largest crowd of the year is expected to witness the clash of two of Oregon's most bitter rivals, a clash that never fails to provide the ultimate in drama and thrilling grid action. Lineups follow:

Medford Shots Take Honors in Oakland Match

Climaxing another successful summer season of smallbore shooting activities, six members of the Medford rifle club shot through the California 100 yd. indoor matches at Oakland last week-end to reestablish their claim as one of the best known rifle clubs of their size in the United States. Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Tuttle, Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Waddell, Ed Lull and Lew Conger all did credit to the local club in fourteen hours of high pressure competition against 150 of California's best.

Mrs. Waddell won the women's championship, with Mrs. Tuttle a close second, with scores of 984 and 983x1000, respectively. Lew Conger did some fine shooting to win place medals in two matches, while Mrs. Tuttle, Mr. and Mrs. Waddell and Lull for the second successive year placed third in the team match in a field of twenty-one teams, with the near perfect score of 799x200.

Rifle club activities will now be transferred to the indoor range in the Natatorium building, where practice and competitive shooting will be conducted during the winter. A plan to divide club members into two divisions will be carried out this year in order to interest the novice, and to permit him to shoot on more even terms with others of his class. This will be termed division 2 and will include all shooters whose rifle and sights do not cost more than \$50. This equipment classification will permit the owner of the less expensive rifle to participate in the fast growing sport of smallbore target shooting, with the subsequent training in the care and handling of firearms, which is becoming more necessary every year.

The annual business meeting and election of officers of the Medford Rifle Club was held last night, and the following officers were elected:

President, Cecil C. Gull; vice-president, C. R. Richmond; executive officer, Ivan K. Waddell; treasurer, H. R. Rinsbarger; secretary, S. M. Tuttle; range officer, Otto Z. Howard.
