Billy Hulén says:

Bowman's Gallop Was a "Perfect" Play a la Rockne

That 74-yard touchdown gallop of Jack Bowman's at Bend Friday night, the burst that enabled the Black Tornado to tie the score and set the stage for the ultimate 12 to 6 Medford victory, would have brought a pleased gleam to the eyes of the late Knute Rockne, if he could have witnessed the play. . . . It was a shining example of what the immortal Notre Dame coach always strived to develop in the offensive tactics of his Fighting Irish. . . . It was a "perfect" play, a play in which every offensive man carried out his assignment to the letter. . . .

Theoretically, every running maneuver of an attacking football machine is a potential touchdown-producing play. . . . If every player of the offensive team is successful in blocking out his designated defensive opponent, the result is a touchdown, with the ball carrier having a clear path to the goal line. . . . such was almost a religion with Rockne, the "perfect" play, and much of Notre Dame's success at that time was due to the amazing number of those "perfect" plays the Irish were able to develop. . . .

Bowman, probably the fastest prep halfback in the state, completed his 74-yard run without an enemy hand being laid upon him. . . . he shot through a quick-opening hole off his own right tackle, and with Don Gillespie knocking over the defensive fullback and halfback, that's all there was to it. . . . Jack, who can negotiate the 100-yard dash in 10 flat consistently, simply flew into the open and over the goal line almost before the Lava Bears knew what was up. . . . a Bend player was within 10 yards of him after he passed the line of scrimmage. . . .

Speaking of that Bend game, Coach Bill Bowerman said it was just as tough and just as viciously fought as the Klamath Falls encounter, which was certainly no pink tea. . . . that makes three bruising battles in a row for the Tigers, and with another one coming up next Friday night when Fritz Kramer brings his Eugene high Axmen to town. . . . these games are getting so tough that even such a word as "breathe" is about 100 more games like the last three and Bill will be taken away to a nice padded cell somewhere. . . . he is probably near the cracking point right now, what with watching his players receive those terrific physical beatings and being forced to endure the mental anguish of ball games that are in doubt right up to the final run. . . .

Before leaving the Black Tornado for today, we would like to rise and remark that never have we seen such a hard-tackling and blocking high school team. . . . the Tigers really sock for keeps. . . . Klamath Falls has admitted that Medford's devastating tackling was what beat them, and Friday night, seven Bend players were carried from the field after being chopped down by savage tackles and blocks. . . . the boys know their fundamentals like no other's business, and they have the mental spark to put that knowledge into actual ferocious use. . . . in other words, they have the old fighting spirit.

Ten for 12, children, and if that isn't smacking them at a pretty good clip, I pickem would like to know what youse guys want, anyway. . . . Pickem named called his first wrestler today, naming Michigan State to beat Santa Clara by one point, but the Broncos won by a lone marker, 7 to 6. That's only two points away, and makes Pickem feel that perhaps he will hit one of those form reversals someday. . . .

The only other game he missed on was the Bend-Oregon Normal affair. The following were correctly prognosticated: Northwestern over Minnesota; Medford over Bend; UCC over Oregon; Cal over Oregon State; Pitt over Fordham; Harvard over Princeton; Notre Dame over Army; Dartmouth over Yale and Texas Christian over Baylor. Murdock and McDonald Renew Grappling Feud Tonight

BELCASTRO FACES FRENCH TERROR IN SEMI-FINAL EVENT

Knox and Schroll Collide in Opening Match—Sockeye Promises Return to Old Roughhouse Technique

Paul Murdock and Sockeye Jack McDonald resume their sensational grappling feud in the Medford armory tonight, meeting in the one-hour main event of a super-special Halloween and ladies' night program which has all the earmarks of causing enough excitement and confusion to put to shame the ghosts and hobgoblins who will stalk the countryside this evening. As usual, the card opens at 8:30 sharp. Four straight capacity crowd is expected by Promoter Mack Lillard.

Pete Belcastro, Weed's Mad Italian and Monte LaDue, French terror, tangle in the middle event, and Buddy Knox and Frankie Schroll collide in the opener. Both these matches will be over the six-round route, with the Belcastro-LaDue squabble fitting right into the general Halloween scheme of things. It is expected to prove one of the wildest and most hair-raising things witnessed here in a month of Halloween.

Defeated in a great three-fall match last week, McDonald, the huge ex-Seaside logger, will be shooting the works in an attempt to even the score with the handsome and popular Murdock, pride and joy of an unpronounceable and unspelling town in Texas. Although he hasn't definitely made his intentions known, Sockeye has intimated that he will forget his clean and scientific tactics this evening and resort to his old method of attack—right and left hand punches to the kisser and stomach and a general roughhouse offensive that hasn't yet failed to bring the desired results.

Murdock, who can stay more consistently clean than any wrestler to ever show here, will again rely upon flashing speed and legitimate grappling maneuvers to make it two straight over the revenge-bent Sockeye. Paul has never been locked in the local house of horror, and he doesn't plan to be tonight. He will feature his devastating thunderbolt hold, which he was unable to use last week, mainly because Sockeye played it smart and surrendered the fall when Paul slapped it on. Tonight, Murdock plans to pay McDonald the full effect of the payoff maneuver, but Sockeye claims he won't have a chance. It should be a great match.

Doc Spear Swaps Punches In Opponents' Locker Room

DETROIT, Oct. 31.—(AP)—The Jolly Dr. Clarence W. Spear, whose grin covers a vast expanse but whose scowl can be black as a goal line fumble, was back in football's limelight today.

The "good doctor," as he is known to Minnesota, Oregon and Wisconsin where he coached teams with pile-driving offenses, paid a little call at the Wayne university dressing room Saturday after his Toledo university eleven had thumped Wayne, 39 to 20.

Accounts differed, but the situation had reached such proportions today Coach Joe Gembs of Wayne, the other leading man in the dressing room-by-play, said he feared Wayne and Toledo might have to quit playing one another.

It seems Spears didn't admire the work of Saturday's officials.

Spears, ever the man to stand up for his rights, said "someone" took punch at him after Gembs had asked him to leave the room, and "I departed after swinging back."

"But I didn't hit anybody," he said. From Gembs:

"That's not so. He started arguing about the officiating. So I said, 'well, Doc, I don't want anything to do with you.'"

Gembs said he held Spears' arm to lead him to the door "and then he swung back at me."

"I jumped back and put up my guard," Gembs said, "and then one of the freshmen coaches jumped in and let him have it. He swung back and then we separated them and got in one blow apiece."

Spears' team had been penalized 70 yards, and during the game he was reported to have made complaints. Spears said Gembs had resented his entrance to the dressing room afterwards and "told me to leave when I walked in."

CINCINNATI, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Remorseful John Barnini of the Providence football team was as bewildered as anyone else today by his blind leap from the bench to tackle Xavier university's quarterback, Tom Hogan, on a touchdown run.

The Providence center wandered around the clubhouse afterward as if the world had caved in on him. He made no allib. He only asked "why did this have to happen to me? All I can say is that I'm awfully sorry."

When the "twelfth man" incident occurred yesterday, Providence had passed ten yards to a touchdown.

Coach Hugh Devore of Providence concurred and said, "it was one of those things that can happen in any game featured by keen rivalry."

EUGENE PICKETS LAW HELD INVALID

EUGENE, Oct. 31.—(AP)—Eugene's ordinance regulating picketing in labor disputes was thrown out by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court Saturday in a decision sustaining the demurrer of labor unions to the city's answer to a suit brought by the unions to enjoin the city from enforcing the ordinance.

The ordinance required registration of pickets with the city recorder and required unions to furnish proof of a genuine labor dispute and a \$5 license fee for each picket. Pickets were not allowed to whistle or sing or make other disturbing noises while picketing.

Judge Skipworth held that the ordinance is void for the reason that it is arbitrary and unreasonable and for the reason that it conflicts with the laws of Oregon.

Laborite Donates \$25,000
