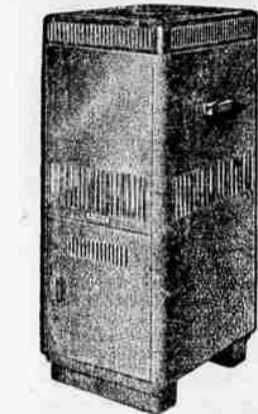

Fire Season Over—General rains over the week-end brought what Rogue River national forest headquarters believed was the end of this year's fire season. Several forest fires last week extended the season farther into the fall than usual. After the week-end rains, however, all remaining lookouts were recalled. About 75 of an inch of rain fell at Lake of the Woods, an average of half an inch in the Applegate district of the forest.
