

CHAMBERLAIN TO SPEED ENFORCING OF ROME ACCORD

Will Offer Motion for Debate Tomorrow in House of Commons — Defense Plans to Be Fully Aired

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain announced in the house of commons today he intended to bring the Anglo-Italian accord of April 16 into force "as soon as possible."

He said he would offer a motion for debate tomorrow to the effect "This house welcomes the intention of his majesty's government to bring the Anglo-Italian agreement into force."

The prime minister spoke to the house as it assembled for a four-day session expected to be devoted largely to debate on the government's rearmament, civilian defense and foreign policies.

Long Held Up
The Anglo-Italian pact, signed at Rome the day before Easter, has been held in abeyance because of failure to achieve a "settlement" in connection with the Spanish civil war.

The Rome accord was designed to provide a comprehensive settlement of all conflicts of British and Italian interests in the Mediterranean, Africa, the near east and Spain. It provided for British recognition of Italy's conquest of Ethiopia and for complete Italian withdrawal from Spain after the civil war and Italy's assurances she had no territorial or political aims in Spain.

Chamberlain refused to be drawn into discussion today of his reasons for deciding to make the accord effective, but it was believed the decision was based on Premier Mussolini's recent withdrawal of 10,000 Italian troops from Spain.

Debate Munich Accord
Shortly after Chamberlain's announcement Clement B. Attlee, leader of the labor opposition, opened a debate on the Munich accord of September 29 by declaring the reluctant frontiers of Czechoslovakia "were even worse than those laid down in the Godesberg plan."

He referred to Adolf Hitler's demands presented to Chamberlain at Godesberg on the Rhine September 22.

The prime minister, beset by anxious questions on both civilian and military defense, promised a full statement on the government's defense plans early in the new session of parliament which will begin November 8.

Wood Hauler Killed
HILLSBORO, Nov. 1.—(AP)—One brother was killed and a second escaped when their wood truck overturned as a banked road partly collapsed under their heavily loaded vehicle near Banks. Francis M. Brown, wood hauler, was instantly killed but his brother, Homer, driver of the truck, escaped.

GENIUS IN YOUNG NO CAUSE FOR JOY

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—(AP)—A woman psychologist today warned parents not to be too pleased if their children show signs of precocious genius.

Professor Leta S. Hollingworth of Columbia University's Teachers college said children with an intelligence quotient above 150—the norm is about 100—are menaced by loneliness, an inferiority complex and a cynical attitude toward life.

"Happily," she added, "gifted children are typically endowed with a keen sense of humor, and are apparently able to mature beyond cynicism in a majority of cases."

Professor Hollingworth said children with intelligence quotients between 130 and 150—indicating mental superiority but not genius—were best assured of health, personal happiness and leadership among their fellows.

Shipping Man Dies

M-W LOSES IN NLRB ARGUMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 1.—(AP)—Montgomery Ward & company's Portland store was ordered to reinstate 23 employees discharged two years ago and pay them back wages aggregating about \$32,000, in a national labor relations board decision received yesterday.

The warehousemen's branch of the longshore union charged the company illegally dismissed union members, conducted a campaign of coercion by use of detectives and declined to bargain. Since then the union has transferred its affiliation from the A.F.L. to the C.I.O.

Although 51 complaints appeared at a labor board hearing more than a year ago, the decision favored only 23. The board said the discharges occurred in November and December, 1936.
