There are thrills—and then more thrills—at the Craterian theatre where the new Gable-Roy picture, "Too Hot to Handle" is really "flooding the screen with excitement."

Opening its local run yesterday, "Too Hot to Handle" should prove to be among the most popular films of the season. Certainly it should be put on the "must list" of every movie-goer who's ever craved action, excitement, and thrills! For Clark Gable and Myrna Loy are doing their stuff in a big way in this rousing story of the newsworld cameramen who are on the spot when anything happens—and when it doesn't, they make their own news.

Of course, we wouldn't believe all that happens during the course of the picture. But neither do we care. After all, motion pictures are supposed to bring entertainment to the screen and, boys and girls, "Too Hot to Handle" delivers in no uncertain terms. Even though he does lose his clip to his rival, he succeeds in scoring another triumph by signing her up with his company and fortune smiles when they're only a short distance away when a munitions ship catches fire.

Scene following scene, each loaded to the hilt with action—and comedy—leads to the climactic sequences of the rescue of the lost filer in the wild jungles of South America. You feel like yelling at times, so tense is the suspense. But native voodoo is matched with white man's magic and everything comes out all right. Melodramatic? Sure it's melodramatic. But isn't that the way most of us like it? That's what has made movies universally popular and pictures like "Too Hot to Handle" will keep that popularity.
