

SABOTAGE CLIQUE CAUSED EXPLOSION ON SHIP, IS CLAIM

an act of criminal sabotage was committed.

"I deeply regret the printed attacks against my country have now resulted in concrete disaster.

"Five brave seamen and a good ship, destined to help in fostering peaceful commerce between our countries, are laid up as the result of a criminal assault on a public carrier, with American travelers and merchandise aboard.

"Had the explosion taken place only 10 minutes later, in the open bay, loss of lives of American citizens as well as of my own countrymen, would undoubtedly have been involved.

"There is some consolation in the hope this rotten act will open the eyes of the general public to the effect of irresponsible poisoning of public opinion perpetrated by a small clique aiming to destroy by secret warfare the basis of ordered society. 'You know whom I mean.'"

Keep Oregon in the United States

The Anti-Labor Bill seeks restriction of labor organizations such as European dictators imposed when they began their march to power. No dictator could gain complete control until he had suppressed free labor organizations.

The three Pacific Coast states have been selected as the ground in which this foreign plant is to take root in America. If the bill is adopted in this state, Oregon will furnish the seed for sowing the tares throughout the nation.

Claiming that this bill is sponsored by the farmers is a libel upon the farmers. It was conceived and is being promoted by the interests which have exploited both the farmers and the industrial laborers.

It would enable an employer to outlaw a strike even though 98 per cent of his employees voted for the strike. It would deny the right of free speech in any boycott. It would establish government by injunction and would deny the right of trial by jury in injunction cases.

Both candidates for Governor oppose the bill.

Such papers as The Oregonian, the Salem Statesman and the Eugene Register-Guard are emphatic in opposing it.

Among those denouncing it are such distinguished educators as Dr. M. O. Sisson, professor of philosophy at Reed College, and Dean Wayne L. Morse, of the school of law of the Oregon State University.

The Portland Council of Churches (Protestant) urges defeat of the measure.

Rev. Fr. George F. Thompson, pastor of Madeleine Church, Portland, and Rev. R. A. McGowan of the Catholic National Welfare Council, vigorously assail the measure.

Numerous other outstanding citizens are open in their opposition.

Conscientious employers and business men are discovering that the bill, if adopted, would favor the chiseling and unscrupulous employer over the honest employer.

Whether Oregon will be the first state to repudiate such un-American legislative proposals and rebuke the cunningly deceptive methods being used to promote it, rests with the voters of the state next Tuesday, November 8.
