

MOODY IMPEACHES GROUPS OPPOSING ANTI-PICKET BILL

Special Co-Ordinator Cites Biased Interests of Opposition — Repeats Need of Racketeering Control

The following address was delivered by Ralph E. Moody over radio station KEX on November 2:

I again speak to the people of the state of Oregon as the co-ordinator appointed by Governor Martin to assist the district attorneys and other law enforcement officers in freeing and ridding the state of all forms of labor racketeering. In my position as co-ordinator I represent all of the people as does every other official who is conscientious in the performance of his duty. In this important position my clients are all of the citizens of the state and I am your servant, and as such I am under obligation to call your attention to the most important matter, so far as the welfare of the state and its citizens is concerned, and that is the unquestioned necessity of the voters of the state at the coming November election giving their approval to the enactment of the bill known as the one which regulates picketing and boycotting.

120 Arrested

The recent prosecutions of persons charged with labor racketeering in throwing bombs and by other means destroying property and stopping the flow of commerce resulted in the arrest of 120 persons charged with 232 crimes, 76 of whom either pleaded guilty or were convicted on trial. Since then, and at present, there has been a temporary suspension of this labor racketeering, but not decided by this bill, for there has been no reformation and there will be no reformation unless the voters of the state adopt the bill regulating picketing and boycotting at the election on November 8 of this year. This bill in labor racketeering activity is only permitted to exist by the overlords in the labor unions for the sole purpose of attempting to convince the people that they have reformed, in order to induce the voters of the state to defeat the measure which is necessary and essential for the protection of the farmers, the industries, the business of the state and the public welfare.

Cites Opposition

Since the initiation of the farmers bill regulating picketing and boycotting, there has developed a well-defined opposition from certain sources—the same sources that are attacking my report to the governor recommending additional legislation for protection from future labor terrorism in this state. Let us examine into this opposition and ascertain whether it is selfish or unselfish, prejudiced or unprejudiced.

First of all we have the opposition of the leaders of the Oregon state federation of labor. During all of the terroristic regime the same federation leaders who are opposing this initiative measure sat idly by and allowed it to run its course without molestation; nor did they as much as lift a finger in the interest of law and order when the sheriffs and city police, descended upon the labor gangsters who had beat up innocent workers, bankrupting business, bombing and burning

property. On the contrary, they marshaled all of their forces, political and otherwise, to hinder and obstruct this necessary police work. Moreover, when the cases against these thugs and gangsters were pending in the courts the annual convention of the A. F. of L. assembled in Tillamook in June of this year, caused a resolution to be passed denouncing the prosecution as "persecutions," and pledging financial aid to the Teamsters union. I read you this resolution:

"Whereas, the Teamsters local unions of the state of Oregon have been singled out in the attempt by subversive groups of this state, to disrupt the labor movement; and

"Whereas, these same groups by the aid of state, county and city officials have carried on a relentless persecution of labor, teamsters union officials and members; and

"Whereas, by this activity on the part of our enemies, it has caused these local unions of teamsters to be in financial difficulty in the conduct of their business;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the Oregon State Federation of Labor and its affiliated unions pledge themselves to render financial aid to those unions in this present controversy."

What are these subversive groups referred to in the resolution? Were they the governor, the state police, sheriffs, city police and detectives who arrested 120 thugs and gangsters for crimes ranging all the way from beat-up of workers, acid throwing, bombing and arson? It would seem to be the only answer that no others were referred to than our chief executive and law enforcement officers, who in accordance with their oath of office were attempting faithfully to do their duty and uphold law and order.

Sees Raided Treasury

To whom does the federation refer in its resolution in averring state, county and city officials have carried on a relentless persecution of local teamsters, union officials and members? Of course it refers to our district attorneys who have been convicting these thugs and gangsters to our judges who have been sentencing them to terms behind the prison bars.

Finally, how does it happen that the local union of teamsters is in financial distress and in need of financial aid from the federation and its affiliated unions? There is only one answer to that question and that is that Al Rosser, executive secretary of the Teamsters union, used the funds of the local for hiring thugs and gangsters to beat up innocent workers and to bomb and burn property, regardless of the consequences to human life.

Permit me here to point out that one of the major purposes of the farmers initiative measure is to prevent in the future any labor boss or racketeer from using the funds of the law-abiding rank and file to hire thugs or, otherwise violate the law. It achieves this purpose by specifically providing that it shall be unlawful for a labor organization to collect dues, fines or assessments in excess of its legitimate requirements, and by giving the members of a union the right to inspect the books and records of their organization.

Has Fee To Earn

Another strong opposition comes from Mr. B. A. Green, who has been, and probably now is, the general counsel of the State Federation of Labor. Naturally, as a lawyer he has a fee to earn, and a position to retain; so we may discount his opposition one hundred percent.

Next we have the opposition of Mr. Charles W. Robinson. Who is Mr. Charles W. Robinson and what have been his recent activities? He was the leading counsel defending Hugh Reynolds, who was secretary and treasurer of the teamsters local, at Eugene and Marshfield. Reynolds was charged with the destruction of per-

sonal property in the breaking of windows in a barber shop, in an endeavor to force the non-union barber to join the union. Reynolds was convicted. His case is now pending on appeal in the supreme court.

After the conviction of Reynolds, Mr. Robinson appeared and as the leading attorney conducted the defense of Dave Rutz. Rutz was charged with the crime of destruction of tractors, belonging to a firm of contractors in The Dalles, in order to compel such contractors to force their employees to join the teamsters' union. Rutz was convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary where he is now confined.

After the Rutz case Mr. Robinson was one of the leading attorneys for Al Rosser and defended Rosser at his trial in Polk county, at which trial Rosser was convicted and sentenced to 12 years in the penitentiary for the crime of arson, in burning a factory known as the Salem box factory, in order to force the owners of that mill and factory to compel their employees to join the union, which they did not want to do. His case is now on appeal to the supreme court.

Grange Master Hit

Next we have the opposition of the master of the Oregon State Grange. The reason for this opposition to the bill becomes apparent when it is realized that for years there has existed a political alliance between the executive committee of the Oregon State Grange and the leaders of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, a political alliance that was renewed at the same annual convention of the Federation of Labor at which it denounced the soon prosecution as persecution.

In view of such circumstances how much weight ought to be given to the arguments advanced by the master of the Grange? Very little, if any, I say.

The burden of the argument against this bill from these sources is one of class prejudice and hatred. They are endeavoring to prejudice you against this constructive piece of legislation by saying the business men and industrialists of the city of Portland and the state have come to the financial aid of the farmers in their campaign for relief through the passage of this measure.

The truth of the matter is that the business men of this state should have taken the lead in initi-

ating this bill and not left the burden to the farmers; and it is proper, when the farmers have borne the burden of the heat of the day, for all good citizens to come to their aid. For it is time the public, business men, and union men and women learn the simple but vital truth that business, industry and labor go up and down with agriculture; time that they learn that if the city of Portland fails to keep the waterfront open to commerce and our land transportation channels open to trade, the farmers cannot market their products and the paralyzation of all business and all employment will ensue.
