

HUNGARY RAISES VOICE FOR MORE CZECH TERRITORY

Enthusiasm Surges in Budapest As Leaders Tell Nation Occupation of 4875 Miles Only Part

(By The Associated Press) Hungary, excited by military occupation of about 4,875 square miles of Czechoslovakia, raised a clamor today for further territorial expansion while Japan paved the way for new exploitation of conquered areas of China.

Russia Sees Trouble In Moscow, Soviet Russia celebrated 21 years of Communist rule last week, with rejoicing for her "coming of age."

War Commissar Voroshilov emphasized the Soviet Union was prepared to meet force with force and George Dimitroff, secretary general of the Communist International, predicted Germany, advancing to the east, might be at war with Russia by late 1941.

At Weimar, Germany, Reichsfuehrer Hitler told 100,000 Nazis yesterday Germany regained greatness through arms and "we won't forget how our success came." He declared, however, Germany's wish was that "world leave us alone" and said he had decided on an army strong enough to assure fulfillment of that wish.

French Plot Charged Franco's powerful Socialist party, charging Nationalists were plotting to seize power on Armistice day, presented a resolution to Premier Daladier demanding guarantees of "free functioning of parliament and the democratic regime."

In Spain, insurgents reported they had reduced Mora De Ebro, last government stronghold on the west bank of the Ebro river, to smoking ruins and had encircled the town. The government, whose surprise counter attacks checked the insurgent eight-day offensive in eastern Spain, ad-

mitted only the "enemy succeeded in making slight advances on a very reduced front."

Japanese forces in Central China were reported attacking Chinese positions along the border of Hunan province in a drive toward hitherto untouched territory.

deal. And word comes that La Guardia is now convinced the president is stronger than ever in the country.

Moreover, there is the fact that Tom Dewey may win, and that, if he wins, he will be the likeliest prospect for the Republican nomination in 1940. If you plan to run for a great office yourself, it is exceedingly tactless to appear to have high regard for the capabilities of your opponent. And there is every indication that La Guardia has begun to think of his own career in terms of 1940.

Among the indications are his complete lack of interest in the business here with Chinese commodities, silks and other valuables selling for next to nothing. One foreigner purchased for less than \$1 a camera of a type sold in the United States for \$350.

It seems probable that La Guardia is calculating on the conservative Democrats capturing their party from the president. In that event, the Democratic presidential choice will be almost indistinguishable from the Republican. And then La Guardia can raise the liberal standard, rally the La Follette, the labor groups, the new dealers and perhaps even the president himself, and march to the wars at the head of a powerful third party movement. It is a daring thought, but you don't have to be a mental telepathist to suspect it is in La Guardia's mind.

It isn't wise to laugh at La Guardia's ambitions, for he is an amazing creature—this band-leader's son with the short, chunky body and the squeaky voice, who achieves, by pure vitality, such an extraordinary effect of human dignity. He is a terrifying opponent, as the New York bankers learned, when La Guardia answered their refusal to lower city interest rates by shaking his finger in their faces and shouting, "You listen to me, you . . . you. If you don't lower the rate this afternoon, I announce that all city relief is stopped because the bankers won't let the city feed the poor."

He is an immensely shrewd politician, a master of tactics, and a born popular leader. As mayor of New York, he took over a squalidly corrupt, hopelessly inefficient, horribly indebted city administration, and transformed it so completely that the greatest city in the world is now also one of the world's best run. And, after the president, he is now the country's most conspicuous liberal.

WHO Are the... Associated Farmers?

Associated Farmers of Jackson County, Inc., was organized here a little over a year and a half ago. The officers are as follows: President, W. J. Warner; Vice-President, S. M. Tuttle; Secretary-Treasurer, W. J. Looker.

The preamble of the declaration of principles of Associated Farmers of Jackson County, Inc. is as follows:

"To protect, preserve and maintain American institutions and ideals; to preserve the Constitutional form of government in both state and nation; to oppose and combat any and all doctrines or practices which imperil the maintenance of these constitutional liberties; to protect American Schools and the constitutional privileges which the educational system of America has brought to all children and students; to fight against the infiltration of subversive doctrines into the educational system and into the government; to combat dictatorship of individuals or groups; to foster and encourage respect for, and to maintain law and order, particularly by cooperating with local, state and national official and government agencies; to promote the prompt, orderly and efficient administration of justice; and to promote and protect the economic and agricultural welfare of the citizens of the United States and particularly of the citizens of Jackson County, Oregon."

Associated Farmers of Oregon, of which the Jackson County organization is an affiliate, is one of the sponsors of the so-called Bill to Regulate Picketing and Boycotting. An opposing argument has been published in the voters' pamphlet, in which the author presumes to portray Associated Farmers in a false light. In order to obtain better information on some of the conditions claimed to exist by the author of that opposing argument, the Secretary of Associated Farmers of Jackson County wrote a letter to Mr. Fred Goodrich, Secretary of Associated Farmers of the Pacific Coast, to which he received the following reply:

"To answer the question regarding wages paid farm workers in California, Oregon and Washington, I prefer to quote direct from an official report issued under date of October 14, 1938, by the United States Department of Agriculture. This report gives farm wage rates as of October 1, 1938. I now quote official government figures:

The same Department of Agriculture report gives the average farm labor wage rates for the United States as follows: Per month with board—\$24.01 Per day with board—\$1.28 Per month without board—\$4.75 Per day without board—1.09

You will note that this official government report gives the wage rates for October 1, 1938, less than one month ago. You will further note that California, Oregon and Washington are paying far more in all brackets than is paid for similar labor throughout the United States.

These government figures also prove the falsity of the statement made by Mr. C. H. Bailey, who says the best farm wage in California is given to grape pickers and "a good grape picker can make \$1.25 a day." The Department of Agriculture says the average farm wage in California, without board, is \$2.85 per day.

Mr. Bailey further intimates that the farmers of California have attempted to exploit those unfortunate migrants who have come into this state because of unbearable conditions in the so-called Dust Bowl. It is true that 250,000 or more of these people have migrated from Arizona, California, Oregon, Idaho and Washington, and so far as it has been humanly possible the farmers of these Pacific Coast states have endeavored to find employment for them. The fact is that despite a great surplus of farm labor there has been no attempt by Pacific Coast farmers to cut wages. To the contrary, and citing Government figures, we have maintained an exceptionally high wage rate.

It is true that in the lower end of the San Joaquin Valley, where cotton is the principal crop, there has been a great over-supply of farm labor. The crop is excellent, but the market is way down in the slumps. Last year, when cotton was being quoted at \$12.00 or more, the farmers paid 90c a hundred to their pickers. This year, with cotton quoted at a little more than \$8.00, they have been paying their pickers 75c per hundred. The average picker earns between \$2.50 and \$3.00 a day; the expert picker earns more, and so far as it has been practicable these Pacific Coast states have given houses within which to live and supplied free fuel, water and lighting. The C. I. O. radicals have moved into the district and attempted to call a strike. They have done this by threatening people who wanted to work. They have not succeeded because most of these newcomers, the migrants, are sincere—they want to work and they have been satisfied with the wage and the working conditions.

Just about three weeks ago Harold Pomeroy, director of the State Emergency Relief Association of California, made an investigation of labor conditions in the lower San Joaquin. He reported that the men who wanted to work could earn as much by picking cotton as they could by accepting employment under the WPA, providing, of course, they were capable of doing the work. He refused to certify for relief men who were idle and who refused to accept jobs that were open to them.

In the statement by Mr. Bailey there is also the statement indicating farmers have made no attempts to provide adequate living quarters for their employees. To answer that I refer to a report made by Timothy A. Beardon, director of the Department of Housing and Immigration of California, to the Governor of California. Before he became a public official Tim Beardon for many years was a labor union leader in California. In his official report Beardon says that during the year 1937 farmers of California spent more than \$1,000,000 in providing and improving cottages and tent shelters for their employees.

The statement of Mr. Bailey that Associated Farmers was formed to enslave the migrants from the Dust Bowl is false on its face. Associated Farmers was started in 1933 and incorporated in 1934 and at that time no one ever heard of a Dust Bowl. In the later years we have done all we could to aid the migrants by keeping the wages up and improving housing conditions.

I grow weary in answering the charge that Associated Farmers is composed of only the great corporate farmers. We have more than 100,000 members, and as far as I know there are not that many great corporate farms in the entire United States. Holmes Bishop, president of Associated Farmers of California, owns and operates a 70 acre farm. Perhaps he should be accused of being an agricultural royalist."

Having pointed out some of the inaccuracies in the opposing argument heretofore mentioned, you will, of course, draw your own conclusions as to the merits of the balance of the statement. It is unfortunate that it has been necessary for the proponents of the proposed legislation to conduct such an extensive campaign, but there was no other course to follow, in view of the heavy smoke-screen that has been thrown up to beguile the real issue.
