# SPRAGUE HEADS GOP VICTORY MARCH

## Republicans Upset Democratic Regimes In Dozen Strategic States

### Holman Smothers Mahoney In Race For Senate Seat

PORTLAND, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Republicans ran up the victory flag on the Oregon political mast today as cascading votes submerged all but two Democrats in major contests and returned control of the legislature to the state's historically dominant party.  
Stretching leads created when the first returns rushed in from industrial and farming counties showed the Republicans had captured, with scarcely a chance for change in the later count, the governorship, regular and short term senate, two congressional seats and all but one of the upper bracket state government posts.  
Pierce Stems Tide  
Walter Pierce of La Grande, former governor and elder statesman, alone stemmed the Republican sweep in national offices, retaining his position as congressman in the second district. Rex Putnam, Democrat appointed by Governor Charles Martin, successfully crushed opposition for superintendent of public instruction.  
Charles A. Sprague, Salem publisher, brought the Republicans their first governor in eight years. His lead over Henry L. Hess, former state Democratic senator from La Grande, marched to 43,612. It far exceeded the margin of safety Hess gained over Governor Martin in last spring's sensational Democratic primary and left little doubt the governor's leanings toward Sprague were effective.  
Returns from 947 of the 1981 precincts gave Sprague 110,081 and Hess 77,469. The Democrats, endorsed by leading New Dealers, was ahead in only Baker, Columbia, Coos and Deschutes counties.  
Mahoney Concedes  
Another New Deal candidate, Willis E. Mahoney of Klamath Falls, conceded defeat to Republican Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, in what had been first expected to be a close battle for the regular term in the U. S. senate. Mahoney, who said he thought he was strong enough to carry through to victory in the face of other Democratic reverses, lost four years ago when he sought the governorship and two years past when he opposed Senator Charles McNary, minority leader.  
The returns from 953 precincts gave Holman 105,471 and Mahoney 83,356. Mahoney led only in Baker, Columbia, Coos, Deschutes, Klamath and Union counties.  
A Republican, too, gained the more or less honorary title for senator for the term expiring Jan. 3. Alex Barry, Portland, led Robert A. Miller, Portland, Democrat, in 953 precincts, 93,120 to 76,230.  
3rd District Close  
The only semblance of a struggle for congress remained in the third district where Representative Nan Wood Honeyman, Oregon's first congresswoman, trailed Homer D. Angell.

### BROWN AND PERRY JACKSON CO. WINNERS

#### COLEMAN RETAINS JUSTICE POSITION BY WIDE MARGIN

Sheriff Syd L. Brown, Democrat, defeated A. E. Brockway, Republican, by 2,827 votes, on complete and incomplete returns from 99 precincts in Jackson county.

Brown was the only Democratic candidate to win the county election, and ran strong in both city and country.  
County Commissioner Otto Caster, seeking re-election on the Democratic ticket, lost to William Perry, Eagle Point, by a majority of 1,833.

In the race for justice of the peace, Medford district, W. R. (Bill) Coleman, incumbent, was re-elected by a majority of 2,420 over his Democratic opponent, James Stewart.

State Senator George Dunn of Ashland, defeated Moore Hamilton, having a lead of 3,318 over his Democratic opponent.  
W. M. McAllister and E. T. Newberry, Republican were named for the lower house, without opposition.

#### NO HAM AND EGGS FOR CALIFORNIA'S ELDERLY CITIZENS

Democrats Retain Only Seat in Senate, Elect Governor But Lose Two Seats in House to Republicans  
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—(AP)—California Democrats today retained their only seat in the senate in a campaign revolving around a unique scrip pension plan and for the first time in 44 years elected a governor.  
The double triumph was slightly dimmed by the loss of two congressional seats to Republicans and a nip and tuck race for lieutenant governor.  
Downey Far Ahead  
Sheridan Downey, Democratic supporter of the "30 every Thursday" pension plan, polled 530,332 votes for senator in 9174 of the state's 12,472 precincts to 457,197 for Philip Bancroft, critic of the pension plan and President Roosevelt.  
In 7978 precincts State Sen. Culbert Olson, former Utah legislator, was given 568,310 votes to 501,933 for Republican Gov. Frank Merriam.  
The "ham and egg" pension plan which Downey supported and a stringent anti-picketing initiative seemed headed for defeat. Both were running behind by a four to three count.  
Republicans, who had held only four of California's 20 congressional seats, captured at least six. Democrats were victorious in eight.  
McGrath Defeated  
The only Democratic congressman to be defeated, however, was John J. McGrath, who lost the eighth district to John Anderson.  
Both Olson and Downey accepted congratulations.  
"I do not consider this a personal victory," said Downey, "but one for liberalism and social security for our senior citizens."  
Olson promised "a state government in sympathy with the principles and policies of the New Deal and of the Roosevelt administration."

### New Deal Suffers First Big Reverse Since Taking Helm

(By the Associated Press)  
The Republican party hit the comeback trail of political power today by upsetting Democratic regimes in a dozen strategic states, among them Pennsylvania.  
It delivered to the New Deal the first major election reverse since Franklin Roosevelt was chosen president six years ago. The Democrats, nevertheless, retained control of congress and more than half the governorships.  
Along the Atlantic seaboard, in the midwest and on to the Pacific coast one Democratic administration after another toppled before the tide of votes.  
About a dozen Republicans contested successfully for governorships now held by Democrats. Eight Republican aspirants won Democratic seats in the senate.  
Over 50 House Changes  
As returns continued to come in, more than 50 House seats switched from the Democratic to the Republican side.  
In the two biggest state elections—New York and Pennsylvania—the major parties split even.  
Gov. Herbert Lehman, New York Democrat, won reelection over Thomas E. Dewey after exciting hours of vote-counting in which first one and then the other pulled ahead.  
Sen. Robert F. Wagner (D-N.Y.), a staunch Roosevelt supporter, also outdistanced his Republican rival and Rep. James M. Mead (D) was chosen to fill the seat made vacant by the death of Sen. Royal S. Copeland.  
In nearby Pennsylvania, just about the reverse occurred. Gov. George H. Earle, who gave the state a "little New Deal," failed in his effort to unseat Republican Sen. James J. ("Pud") Dill.  
Arthur H. James, who campaigned on a promise to undo most of what Earle has done, was elected governor. His Democratic opponent was Charles Alvin Jones.  
South Lines Hold  
Only in the "Solid South" did Democratic lines remain intact. Across the middle and northern sections of the country the Republicans counted governorships in these states which, at least for the last two years, the Democrats had ruled:  
Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Kansas, Massachusetts, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Michigan, Ohio, and Wyoming.  
They also captured the Wisconsin administration from Gov. Philip P. LaFollette, head of the Progressive party, and appeared favored to win in Minnesota, where the Farm-Laborites have been in power since 1930.  
Senate upheavals were not so large, but they far exceeded Democratic predictions of what the Republicans would win. In addition to Pennsylvania, Republicans captured Democratic senate seats in Connecticut, Kansas, New Hampshire, New Jersey.

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### PARDON FOR MOONEY LOOMS WHEN OLSON BECOMES GOVERNOR

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Governor-elect Culbert Olson today started preparation of a statement announcing that he will pardon Thomas J. Mooney, convicted in the San Francisco preparedness day bombing case of 1916.  
The Mooney case has been the focus of action by liberal leaders for many years and four Republican governors had refused to grant a pardon to Mooney.  
Olson, while serving in the state senate, supported a resolution last year which sought to effect the pardon by action of the legislature.  
The liberal leader, first Democrat elected to governorship of California in 44 years, said his view was the same today as it was when he supported the resolution on March 16, 1937.  
Olson said he would consider Mooney's application for a pardon in the firm belief he was "convicted on false testimony and by prejudice."

### DIRECTED ACQUITTAL DENIED BY COURT IN SPY SUSPECT'S TRIAL

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Federal Judge John C. Knox today refused to direct a verdict acquitting two men and a woman charged with spying in this country for the German government.  
Defense counsel moved for the directed verdict during the trial of Johanna Hofmann, haidresser on the liner Europa; Otto Hermann Voss, former airplane mechanic, and Erich Glaser, former U. S. army private in the air service.  
Judge Knox answered sharply the defense counsel's contention Miss Hofmann could not be held accountable for actions in Germany or on German boats where she is subject to German law and the government could not act against constraints by German agents in Germany.  
"I can't understand the theory that the German government could send the Bremen and Europa here laden down with spies and we could not act because their government sent them," the court ruled.

### THREE COUNTIES WOULD STAY WET

PORTLAND, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Anti-prohibition sentiment prevailed in elections yesterday in three counties and four cities to determine whether to place the sale of beer and wine in liquor stores and to prevent a liquor store from being located within a quarter of a mile of a church or school. Returns from 1,165 precincts showed the bill losing 136,760 to 77,402.  
The two measures to prohibit slot machines and gaming devices carried, while the initiative to legalize gambling was defeated. In 867 precincts there were 92,370 for and 53,904 against the anti-slot machine bill, 88,123 for and 55,375 against the anti-gambling device measure, and 62,448 for and 80,286 against the bill to legalize gambling.  
The bill to require compulsory physical examinations of marriage license applicants carried overwhelmingly, returns from 867 precincts showing 124,279 for and 30,102 against.  
Stockholders in state banking corporations failed in their attempt to escape the double liability provision, there being 65,945 for and 69,039 against in 875 precincts.  
Legislators again lost their fight for pay increases when the voters rejected, 70,030 to 65,945 in 875 precincts, the referendum to raise the salaries from \$3 to \$4 a day.  
The bill to purify Oregon's lakes and rivers carried 109,158 to 33,762 in 864 precincts, while the referendum to give the governor 20 days instead of five to consider bills after legislative adjournment carried 105,307 to 42,982.

### STEADMAN ELECTED MAYOR OF PHOENIX

PHOENIX, Nov. 9.—(Sp.)—W. D. Steadman was elected mayor of Phoenix in yesterday's city election, polling 100 votes to 44 for Bert Stancliffe.  
Edna W. Bourne received 124 votes for city recorder, compared to 7 for her opponent, Nettie Hallcraft. N. V. Heare was elected treasurer with 132 votes.  
Councilmen elected were J. A. Richey, R. S. Purry, and M. Prince.
