

Undeclared Weed Cougars Will Invade Tiger Lair Armistice Day

CLASSY VISITORS HAVE REPUTATION FOR BALL HEAVING

Northern California Champs Expected to Give Bowerman Boys Tough Afternoon—Kickoff at 2 P. M.

Weed, California high school's latest pass-crazy Cougars, undefeated and untied in two years of northern California and southern Oregon competition, move into Medford tomorrow afternoon to provide the annual Armistice Day football fireworks for Coach Bill Bowerman's big Black Tornado. The clash, which will be the only one staged here in daylight this season, starts at 2 o'clock sharp. Advance ticket sales indicate a crowd of upwards of 4000 will witness the encounter.

Light and dazzling fast, with a colorful attack built around Joel Fletcher, great Negro left halfback, the Californians will come to Medford with one of the finest records of any team to ever perform here. Last season, Weed was undefeated, untied and unscored-upon, and won the Shastka county conference title with ease. This year, the Cougars have beaten Ashland, Dunsmuir twice, Trask twice and Redding once. Although they have been scored on in this campaign, few of their victories were by extremely narrow margins, and they are again champions of their conference.

Have Fine Record

Weed is coached by Jack Danilovich, who is assisted by Al Nichellini, former St. Mary's All-Conat halfback and ex-professional star. Nichellini has brought to the Cougars many of St. Mary's colorful and razzle-dazzle tactics, as well as teaching them to toss that apple around as they do in the play-for-pay brand of football. The Cougars are considered one of the best teams to ever be developed in northern California, and positively the most pass-conscious.

Winners of three straight games, undefeated in Oregon and gunning for the mythical state championship, the Black Tornado has taken things fairly easy this week in preparation for the game which may prove their toughest of the season. Yesterday, main drove the Tigers into the gym for a "skull" in the two days of the week were devoted to polishing of the offense, which clicked for four touchdowns against Eugene last Friday, and to pass defense work.

All Right Looms

With Weed definitely catalogued as a passing team, and Medford showing signs of also developing into an aerial aggregation, the game tomorrow may turn into an atmospheric battle, with Fletcher pitching for Weed and Shorty Campbell, Bob Newland and Jack Bowman firing for the Tigers.

Coach Bowerman announced today that there would be little change in Medford's starting lineup. Bill Caples or Gene McCurley, back in action after a month on the sidelines with a broken rib, will open at quarterback. Bowman will be at left half, Rodney Stead at right half and Louie Thurman at full. Another backfield will see Caples or McCurley at quarter, Campbell at left half, Bill Piche at right half, and Newland at full. It was this latter backfield that sparked so sensationally against Eugene, and the mentor plans to send it into action at the first opportunity.

Weed Rumored to Be Ungentlemanly Gridiron Outfit

Not having seen Weed high's razzle-dazzle Cougars perform this season we cannot vouch for the positive veracity of the following, but it has been reported by good authority that the Californians, who clash with Medford's Black Tornado in the annual Armistice Day clash at the stadium tomorrow afternoon, play a brand of football that wouldn't exactly pass muster with Emily Post.

The rumor has sifted into Medford that the Weed boys are positively not gentlemen. We understand that in one of their two games with Trask this year, several near riots occurred when Weed players forgot their manners to the extent of doubling up their fists and pretending they were in a boxing ring. At other times, so the story goes, the Cougars passed away the evening by barely staying within the borderline separating vicious but legitimate football from illegal and downright dirty football.

Weed played Ashland in the opening game of this season, and beat the Grizzlies, 13 to 6. Coach Hill Bowman of the Tigers was an interested spectator at the encounter, and he reports that Weed didn't appear to be overly rough. In fact, Bill says, it was a pretty clean game, the only outstanding features of which were the three- and four-notch lateral passes Weed tossed at Ashland. Nope, Bill says, Weed played perfectly legitimate football, although at times it looked like the Cougars were using mirrors on their lateral pass plays.

So, maybe that nasty rumor concerning Weed's alleged bad reputation is merely a rumor. However, where there's a spark, there's usually at least a smok, and perhaps the Cougars are one of those gridiron clubs that forget what they have learned in Sunday school, when they get on the playing field. It is possible that Weed was clean against Ashland, but has since learned some tricks. We shall see tomorrow afternoon from 2 to 4.

Not that this fact is important one way or another, but if the Tigers clash the Cougars tomorrow, it will be the first Medford victory over a California high school aggregation in two years. Last season the Tornado dropped a 12 to 20 verdict to Eureka, and this year lost to the same club, 6 to 13. Medford's last win over any California team was in 1936, when the locals walloped Eureka, 19 to 0, in this village.

On the face of things, considering the strength of opponents faced by both teams, etc., the Tigers don't figure to lose to Weed, even though the California outfit has not been defeated in two years. Medford has undoubtedly come through a tougher schedule of games than has Weed, which plays in the Shastka county conference, not the best in the west. Weed beat Ashland, as before men-

tioned, 13 to 6. Klamath Falls beat Ashland, 27 to 0, and Medford beat Klamath Falls, 6 to 0. All of which, by comparative scores, indicates Medford is 26 points better than Weed.

That, however, is a big laugh, as all comparative score business usually is. (For example, the Medford-Klamath Falls game, Klamath Falls angle) Medford won't beat Weed by 26 points; as a matter of fact many persons close to the football situation hereabouts have their doubts whether Medford will even beat Weed. Personally, our opinion of the game is that the Black Tornado will manage to scratch out a narrow victory, by a touchdown or maybe by one point, but as for that 26-point "dope" it just doesn't stand to reason. Unless, of course, the Cougars come here with their backfield on crutches and their line paralyzed from the waist down.

That was no "scare" story Coach Bill Bowerman released yesterday concerning the Tornado's overconfidence, and it is because of that fact that Medford stands a good chance to get its ears knocked off. It will be something of an upset if Weed does beat the Tigers, not a startling one, because Medford will enter the game slight favorites, but overconfidence has probably been at fault in more form-reversals than any other thing. If the Tigers are mentally "down" and Weed is mentally "high," look for the Cougars to cop.

COAST BASEBALL MOGULS CONVENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Adoption of the 1939 baseball schedule and attempted solution of the case of the "homeless" Hollywood club were major problems confronting directors of the Pacific Coast league in their annual meeting here today.

The Coast league moguls were expected to choose a 24-week straight through schedule from a dozen submitted by Herb McFall, former secretary of the Oakland team.

The 1938 schedule proved unsatisfactory to some of the clubs, namely San Francisco and Oakland, which did not play each other during the entire first half.

Hollywood, its franchise transferred to the movie community last season after many years as the San Francisco Mission, played its 1938 home games in the Los Angeles Coliseum, which was a temporary arrangement which President Dave Fleming of Los Angeles said would not be renewed.

Apparently, therefore, the Hollywood club, controlled by Herbert W. Hays, former Pacific Coast financier, either must build a park in its home town, transfer to another city or become a traveling team.

CALIFORNIA STAR WILL GET \$75,000 FOR 50 MATCHES

Flat Sum Agreed Upon After Long Hold Out for Hundred Grand—Tour Opens January 3 in Garden

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—(AP)—Walter L. Pate, captain of the United States Davis cup tennis team, today announced Don Budge would turn professional and go on tour for Promoter Jack Harris.

Budge accepted Harris' offer of a flat guarantee of \$75,000, \$25,000 of which he received yesterday. He will be paid another \$25,000 on March 1 and the remaining third when his tour ends.

However, the Oakland, Calif., star, also has the privilege of taking a percentage of the gate if the percentage should come to more than \$75,000. Harris said Budge had been holding out for \$100,000 and that was what had delayed the oft-rumored announcement of his turning professional.

Budge's tour will open January 3 in Madison Square Garden against Ellsworth Vines, and will include about 50 matches all over the country. Accompanying the two will be Bruce Barnes and Dick Skeen.

Gonzaga Coach Wins \$1000 With Tale of "Moan Lowe"

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 10.—(AP)—A nightmare moan from the heart of "Moan Lowe," Shanghai, China (alias Mike Pecarovich of Gonzaga) whose Chinese quarterback caught a Japanese bomb instead of a punt, was awarded the \$1,000 first prize in the national coaches' moaning contest by the Spokane Athletic Round Table today.

Mike's letter was selected winner by the sports editors of 11 western newspapers to whom the five best letters were sent by the Round Table.

The great Chinese team, wrote Moan Lowe, had a line which was the original "Chinese wall."

In the center of the mighty line was Do Pe, greatest of all great centers and snow white, despite charges of professionalism by yellow papers.
