WEATHER FACTOR IS REFLECTED IN WEEK'S SHOPPING

Little Uniformity in Different Sections of Country — Average Showing Better Than for Year Ago

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—(AP)—The vagaries of the weather accounted for a spotty and irregular trend in the past week's retail trade, said Dun & Bradstreet today in their weekly business survey.

"There was little uniformity in trade activity reports from different sections of the country," the survey commented, "although the majority of stores showed some gain over last week and last year because of the inclusion of election day totals."

"Cold accelerated the distribution of seasonal merchandise in some areas, but rain and record high November temperatures discouraged buying of cold weather needs in other."

"Comparisons with the corresponding week of 1937 were again influenced by the changed date of election day. Sales volume on the holiday varied from 8 per cent above to 20 per cent below last year's election day, but in many stores was more than double the volume for Tuesday of this week a year ago."

"The average showing for the full week was therefore somewhat better than last year with the gain falling between 1 and 7 per cent. "Nearly all branches of the wholesale market were busier than in the previous week. The chief gains were in Christmas merchandise, although some markets reported requests for immediate shipment of winter merchandise the most numerous in weeks."

Headquarters for the club are located at 111 East Eighth street at which place persons may inquire if interested in joining the organization which is purely a civic endeavor. The club has purchased a new deluxe Cup plane equipped with 50 horsepower motor, a new development of this year, which is used for instruction and flying by the club members.

SALEM'S DEFEAT BY AXMEN BOOMS TIGER PRESTIGE

SALEM, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Undeclared and untied Salem, a claimant of last season's Oregon high school football title, fell before the Eugene Axmen, 12 to 6, here last night. The defeat broke the Vikings string of 13 consecutive victories. Salem led when Don Walker scored 65 yards to score in the second period. A fumble in the second period and an interception in the third set Eugene up for the victory-winning touchdowns.

With the decisive trouncing last night of Salem by Eugene's Axmen, the mythical state championship stock of Medford high's Black Tornado skyrocketed to the point where now, only the Tigers and McLoughlin high of Milton-Freewater are undefeated in the state outside of Portland.

Medford, meeting Weed, Cal., today and with Grants Pass and Ashland remaining on the schedule, gained tremendous prestige when Eugene whacked Salem, unbeaten in 15 consecutive games. The Black Tornado last Friday night walloped Eugene, 25 to 19. Mac High is clashing with Pendleton today, and is expected to win easily. In case they should lose, however, and Medford beat Grants Pass and Ashland, the Tigers will be the team in the state.

Coach Bill Bowerman of the Tornado was noncommittal today regarding the possibility of a post-season game between Medford and possibly Mac High, in case Medford continues unbeaten. He stated it was time enough to start thinking about that when the Tigers hurled Ashland and Grants Pass, if they did. However, he stated that such a game was not an impossibility.
