

MISS ROSENBERG VOTED QUEEN OF JUNIOR CARNIVAL

Presided over by Queen Nanette Rosenberg, the annual Medford Junior high school carnival was held Wednesday night, with a record crowd of fun-seekers attending to enjoy a fine program presented by

students and an elaborate array of booths of all varieties and descriptions. Queen Rosenberg, crowned in a colorful coronation ceremony by Curt Hopkins, president of the Junior high school associated student body, waved her wand at exactly 8:15 to open the carnival, and from then until 11 hilarity reigned supreme. Princesses to the queen were Joan Elliott and Betty Frey. Lola Pringle, Annice Scripser and Jean Eddy were the queen's ladies-in-waiting. The program started at 7 and lasted until 11:15. It featured spectacular tumbling acts by students, who built pyramids four high; a circus parade, with students disguised to represent jungle animals; selections by the Junior high school orchestra and two numbers by the boys' glee club. The queen was elected by votes, which were obtained through the sale of tickets to the carnival. Miss Elliott, as first princess, received the second highest number of votes, and Miss Frey was third.

HAWAII, ALASKA ON QUAKE EDGE

HONOLULU, T. H., Nov. 11.—(AP)—A severe earthquake, apparently centered yesterday in the Pacific ocean between the Aleutian and Hawaiian islands, sent tremors through Alaskan communities and a small tidal wave against Hawaii island shores. There were no reports of damage. The tidal wave, estimated by Lieut. Commander J. H. Peters of the U. S. coast geodetic survey to be traveling at a speed of 450 miles an hour, caused a maximum rise and fall of nine inches in Honolulu harbor's water level, starting at 3 p. m. (5:30 p. m. P.S.T.), more than four hours after the first shock was recorded. The wave movement, imperceptible to persons standing the harbor, reached a peak about 4:30 p. m. and then began subsiding. In Washington, D. C., the war department reported a radio check of several Alaskan points indicated there had been no earthquake damage of consequence in that territory. (Continued from Page One.) national-socialists thereby and that means also anti-Semitism. "While I would not have done as the people did yesterday yet I admit that inwardly I stood completely on the side of the people." Goebbels said there were not sufficient police to meet the situation yesterday. "We did not have 100,000 police available to put one before every Jewish shop," he asserted. Goebbels closed with a declaration Germany's future treatment of Jews "depends both on their behavior here and that of Jews abroad." "If Jews abroad have a heart for their coreligionists in Germany let them be truthful in what they say about us," he warned. "From their own standpoint I consider them unwise in writing so much about the Jews in Germany. Maybe Americans will learn therefrom (writings about Jews in Germany) what measures to adopt in their own country to solve the Jewish problem." The border between Poland and Lithuania never has been officially settled since the two states were brought into being after the World war.
