

PORTLAND FIRMS PUT IN LOW BID ON CITY PAVING

United in a joint venture, the Newport Construction company and Kern & Kibbe, both of Portland, were apparently the low bidder for the Medford paved street reconstruction contract.

The bids were opened by the council at a meeting in city hall yesterday morning. In all six bids were submitted. All were referred to the city superintendent's department for checking and report at the regular council meeting Tuesday night when probably a resolution will be adopted expressing intent to accept the low bid subject to PWA approval. The reconstruction program is a PWA project.

The joint bid submitted by the Newport Construction company and Kern & Kibbe was \$118,673 for a two-inch topping of Amleite.

Harold Blake of Portland submitted the apparent second low bid, \$122,497.73 for a two-inch topping of asphaltic concrete. Third apparent low bid was submitted by Warren Northwest, Inc., of Portland, \$123,195.19 for a two-inch topping of asphaltic concrete. The Warren bid slightly exceeded the advertised approximate amount available for the job, \$125,000.

The bidders were required to submit an alternative offer for a topping of 1 1/2 inches in case the bid on the two-inch topping exceeded the amount of money available.
