Wednesday Evening Concert Program Is Colorful Event

The second of a series of concerts by the Medford Music club was given last Wednesday evening at the home of Mrs. Margaret Fabrick.

The concert, given by Elizabeth and Harlow Mills, was unique in its appeal to every type of person, from the uninitiated to the seasoned concert goer.

The Rumanian and Hungarian music played by the artists was as colorful as the woven fabrics they wore. Each was dressed in native peasant costumes of Rumania.

Some one has described genius as an enormous capacity for detail. These two musicians add this rare gift to their youthful enthusiasm and mature judgment. Beginning with simple folk themes, tracing through the romanticists who elaborate upon these themes, and on to arrangements by the modernists, their music was educational as well as inspiring.

One seldom hears difficult violin music performed with truer clarity and musical understanding. In the Sarasate Air, the modern Hora Staccato, arranged by Heifetz, and Hayek's ultra modern Tzigane, Elizabeth Mills was superb.

Harlow Mills' piano technique and thorough musicianship was adequate for the Liszt Hungarian rhapsody; however, his main thought seems to be in the field of composition, research, and accompanying. As an accompanist, he gave two of his compositions of contrasting thought: "Topsy Boy, clever and with good humor, and the very fine Adagio movement from his impressive Italian Sonata.

The appreciative audience was impressed by the genuine sincerity of purpose and personal charm of Mr. and Mrs. Mills.
