# FALL FROM CLIFF HUNTERS PERILED BY HEAVY SNOWS

**BURNS, Nov. 12.—(AP)—**"Butter" Shields of Seneca, told today how he had to fall over a steep hillside to find himself after being lost this week on an elk hunt.  
Shields said he had wandered all Friday night in sub-zero weather after losing his bearings. Almost exhausted, he leaped against a tree and started to doze. He awakened to feel himself falling, was knocked unconscious by some object and when he regained his senses he found himself at the bottom of a steep hill, from where he commenced in making his way to a camp fire of another group of hunters.

Brought to a hospital here, he was found to be suffering only from exhaustion and frozen ears. Employed by a logging company, Shields is well known in eastern Oregon baseball.
