

Belcastro and McDonald Top Wrestling Bill of Fare at Armory

RED LYONS FACES FRANKIE SCHROLL IN MIDDLE EVENT

Sockeye Due for Victory Or Final Acknowledgement Pete Is Better Man — Opener Will Be Clean

Pete Belcastro vs. Jack McDonald. Red Lyons vs. Frankie Schroll. Cecil McGill vs. Bobby Wagner.

This is the bill-of-fare to be served by Promoter Mack Lillard in his weekly wrestling feast at the Medford armory tonight. First gong sounds at 8:30.

In the top spot will be two of the fastest and hottest wrestlers currently in town who will be clashing for the third time on the local mat. Tonight's battle will be something of a climax to their long-standing feud and each has made dire threats to tear the other to pieces.

To date Belcastro has much the best of it. Twice he has pinned the touted strong man from the north-west logging camps. Pete's only defeat came one night when the two gladiators put wrestling aside to settle their grudge with a plain, old-fashioned flat fight. Of course they wore gloves but that really didn't hinder them much as they made no pretense of ever having heard of the Marquis of Queensbury. In that mad battle Pete took one on the chin and folded up on the canvas for the night.

Both Want Revenge

Like all wars, that battle really settled nothing. Pete has sought revenge to wipe out the disgrace of taking the count with gloves on and Sockeye Jack McDonald has sought revenge to make up for his two wrestling defeats.

If the Sockeye doesn't come through tonight, he might as well pack his dressing gown and shorts and take the first fast freight out of here. He can scarcely ask for another match if he goes down for the third time tonight.

Nor will Jack have the crowd with him if he doesn't unlimber some of the toughness for which he is supposed to be noted. The big ex-lumberjack has been going soft of late and in his last two starts he has been down almost to the class stage. Why he even smiled at the audience and shook his opponent's hands so many times one would think he was at a tea party instead of a wrestling match.

Must Get Tough

Tonight, however, it is expected that the Sockeye will revert to type in an effort to batter the Mad Italian into oblivion. He is by now well aware of the fact that the only way he can beat the unscrupulous Pete is by some tough onslaughts. He will have a tough time of it even then, for the Weed Wop wants to get Sockeye out of his path once and for all. When Pete feels that way about things, watch out. Anything can and often does happen.

Pete is sort of because his only request regarding tonight's match was refused. Pete wanted to meet Sockeye without a referee in the ring but the boxing commission said nothing doing. The last time that was done, Pete almost beat up the audience as well as the boxing commission.

Good Middle Match

The middle event should be no less exciting than the top match. Red Lyons is as tough and dirty as they come but the popular Frankie Schroll is a veteran of the mat and can take it as well as dish it up when the going gets rough. If he can knock on his famous crocodile clutch, the Joplin Ghost will fade back into the spirit world.

The opener should produce the evening's dish of clean, fast, scientific wrestling. Cecil McGill and Bobby Wagner gave a great exhibition of mat work last week and were rematched at the instant demands of the wrestling fans.

The first two matches will be under the Australian system of six ten-minute rounds or two falls out of three. The main event will be under the American system of one hour of wrestling, two falls out of three. The way it looks either Pete or Sockeye will be out for the night long before the hour is up.

GAELS' AERIAL ATTACK WHITEWASHES BRONCOS 7 TO 0 IN MAJOR UPSET

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—(AP)—St. Mary's Gael, using a deadly aerial attack, pushed the Santa Clara Broncos out of the hitherto undefeated class with a 7 to 0 whitewashing yesterday.

Both ball clubs played airtight defensive games the first half, but in the second half took to the air. St. Mary's pushed across its touchdown in the third quarter on a march started from the Bronco 35. Four passes coupled with a couple of stabs at the line put the ball on the two from where fullback Herb Smith pushed over for the touchdown. Quarterback Mike Ferris made the try for point.

Santa Clara fought desperately in the final quarter, but the Gaels in three dramatic goal line stands hung on to their lead.

More than 60,000 fans saw the game, one of the nation's major upsets.

Statistically the Broncos had a slight edge, making eight first downs to seven and 88 yards from scrimmage to 79. The Gaels attempted 11 passes and completed 7 of them. Broncos tried 30 passes, completed five and had four intercepted.

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TROJAN UNHORISING IS BAD HEADACHE FOR GRID EXPERTS

7-6 Victory by Huskies Defies Regular Excuses—Conference Championship Situation in Bad Muddle

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Monday morning quarterbacks, who have been able to explain away every football upset this season, found themselves stumped today.

The regular excuses weren't flexible enough to cover the 7 to 6 defeat of Southern California's Trojans by Washington's Huskies. Most of the experts went overboard in the biggest splash of the year. So did the Trojans. And the Huskies rocked the boat.

Backtracking the pigskin trail recalls this picture: Southern California, unbeaten survivor of the Pacific coast conference race, lined up at Seattle a 3 to 1 favorite to win from a Washington team three times defeated in league play.

Husks Had Power
There was rain in the air and a soggy field underfoot, but Southern California, boasting the greatest manpower in the far west, was expected to roll on unchecked in any kind of weather to the title and the Rose Bowl.

Washington turned in sixty minutes of top speed ball. The margin of victory was only one point—a successful try for point after touchdown—but the statistical chart showed the Huskies far out in front. They piled up 167 yards from scrimmage against 77; 45 yards from passes against none; ten first downs to three and once drove to the Trojan one-yard line in an unsuccessful scoring try.

This astounding reversal scrambled the conference championship race into a confusing situation which may end with three teams tied for the leadership.

The standings list Southern California and California at the top with five wins and one defeat, U. S. C. 13 to 7. California, meanwhile, has a 14 to 7 win over Washington to its credit.

The University of California at Los Angeles and Oregon State college have each won three and lost two.

Classie This Week
Games this week-end will be top-stuffed by the 35th meeting between Stanford and California. It was established in 1892 and to undergraduates and alumni is the annual "big game." Some 80,000 fans, including graduates from classes of the '30s, will be on hand for the classic at Berkeley, which this year, at last, finds California the favorite.

Oregon and Washington will hook up at Portland in their old-time rivalry in the only other conference contest. On its latest showing, Washington probably will be a mild favorite.

Three inter-sectional engagements are billed—Marquette against Arizona at Tucson; Hardin-Simmons against Loyola at Los Angeles and Idaho against Utah Aggies at Ogden.
