HILLAH SHRINERS PLAN CEREMONIAL AT GRANTS PASS

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 15.—(Sp.)—Grants Pass pobles of Hillah Temple of the Shrine are rushing preparations for the ceremonial to be held here November 19.

In fee and colorful garb, the Shriners will "invade the sacred domain of the Cavemen and hold a fall ceremonial under the leadership of Illustrious Potentate Austin B. Brownell," says the "Red Pez" of the local publication of Hillah Temple.

The Josephine county fairgrounds buildings have been selected for the affair, second ever to be held at Grants Pass. The first was staged 20 years ago. Hillah Temple's membership extends as far north as Eugene, east to Lake county, west to the Pacific, and south into California.

The ceremonial program will be launched at 2 p. m., when quaking noices will be registered by Recorder R. E. Dedrick. After a business session, a parade will be held on the streets of the city, beginning at Fifth and A streets and ending at the city park. Rex Barnett will be in charge of the parade, featuring the divan, uniformed units, nobility and novices.

Noble L. M. Mitchell will welcome Shriners at a hospitality room after the parade, and the traditional banquet will follow.

The Temple's band will entertain with a concert, the patrol will show the newest maneuvers, and the drum and bugle corps will perform for the entertainment of the nobles.

The reception of Illustrious Potentate Austin B. Brownell and his divan and presentation of past potentates, will precede the induction of novices, who will be led over the scorching sands for the enjoyment of the assembled nobles.

As a special feature, new to Hillah ceremonials, there will be a midnight jamboree.

Excavation Oglers' Chief Is Invited to Join Union

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(AP)—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., founder of the "Sidewalk Superintendents' Club"—New York's first organization of steam-shovel kibitzers—got a bid to join the union today.

In a letter from the office of Left Superintendent's local 154 AFI-affiliated building service employees international union, Rockefeller was notified the union claims "full authority over all building superintendents."

The letter declared Rockefeller's excavation ogles at Rockefeller Plaza were "actually superintending" a new building project there and "to avoid any jurisdictional disputes that may arise between your organization and ours," he should accept an honorary membership card in the union local.

Such a membership, the letter said, would protect the interests of the kibitzers "at all times."

Rockefeller inaugurated the "Sidewalk Superintendents' Club" last Thursday when 500 charter membership cards were passed to sidewalk quarterbacks.

The membership cards, inscribed with an old Dutch motto meaning "the best pilots stand on the shore," permit entrance to a covered terrace promenade, 100 feet long, overlooking the digging operations.

Rockefeller decided to establish the club when a foreman nudged him while he was watching his own building excavation and told him: "All right, buddy, move on now."

Rockefeller said he would accept the card but would not join the union.

SPRAGUE OUTLINES RITES HELD FOR FUTURE POLICIES

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Charles A. Sprague, Oregon's governor-elect, told several hundred Portlanders at a chamber of commerce luncheon Monday that he intended to tackle the problems of the state in a "realistic manner" and warned that they could not be solved by rigid conformance to inflexible political beliefs.

He repeated campaign declarations that he was and would continue to be progressive in ideas and conservative in finance.
