WILSON TO GIVE F. D. R. REPORT ON ABUSING OF JEWS

Wilson, whom President Roosevelt has appointed a delegate to the Pan-American conference next month, said "There is a real danger of the growth of intolerance here in America" because "unchecked mass brutality is contagious."

Former President Hoover declared the situation "makes us fearful for the whole progress of civilization and added it is bringing to Germany 'moral isolation from the entire world.'"

Relations between the United States and Germany in general have not been of the best in the last year, although Ambassador Wilson, a career officer of many years experience, was sent to Berlin with the intention of bettering them.

Germany has not replied to repeated notes from the United States requesting her to assume Austria's debts to this country. The United States protested in May against a decree requiring the registration of property of American Jews in Germany as a forerunner to the confiscation of the property.

How much, if any, of that property has suffered in the anti-Semitic outbreaks of the last few days is not known here.

HOLIDAY PRICES SET FOR TURKS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Thanksgiving day will be a real turkey event this year, George Makins, manager of the California Turkey Growers' exchange predicted today in announcing the association's prices for the holiday trade.

San Francisco prices to wholesalers, Makins said, would be 23 cents a pound for young toms and 25 cents for hens. Local prices will be 15 cent higher, or 38 1/2 and 25 1/2 cents. These prices are two cents a pound lower than last year. Only rarely have they been lower.

OREGON TURKEYS LARGE THIS YEAR

PORTLAND, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Everybody who has anything to do with turkeys on Thanksgiving day should be happy.

The biggest turkeys in history are being shipped from Oregon, one of the largest turkey-raising states and although prices are under a year ago, producers still are making money because of the low cost of feeding.

Market sources said today that shipments to the Atlantic coast had reached 2,250,000 pounds, many birds exceeding the average of 21 1/4 pounds. Matching the big turkey crop is the largest cranberry production in northwest history. Prices range from \$3.25 to \$3.75 a box.

FRENCH ACT TO MAKE DALADIER DICTATOR

PARIS, Nov. 15.—(AP)—A plan to make Premier Edouard Daladier virtual dictator of France within the framework of Republican government was pushed in parliamentary circles today by his friends.

Under the plan, which was reported to have been favorably received by Daladier, the chamber of deputies elections scheduled for the spring of 1940 would be postponed two years. In return, the deputies would vote Daladier a continuation of his semi-dictatorial decree powers until 1942.
