

### PAVING PROJECT BID IS APPROVED SUBJECT TO PWA

Newport Construction Co., and Kern and Kibbe Joint Proposal of \$118,673 Has Council Approval

City council last night voted to send to the PWA regional office in Portland for approval a proposed resolution awarding the contract for the reconstruction of paved streets.

The proposed resolution would award the contract to the Newport Construction company and Kern & Kibbe, Portland firms whose joint bid of \$118,673.28 was low.

The meeting was adjourned to 5 p. m. Friday when it is expected word will have been received from the PWA paving the way for the actual awarding of the contract.

In response to a petition from property owners and tenants, the council voted to provide additional light along Cottage street as recommended by the building and light committee.

A. H. Banwell, manager of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce asked and was granted permission to work with the city superintendent's department in assembling facts on the desirability of using Medford as one of two places in Oregon for establishing an aviation school for the U. S. Army.

The proposal resulted from a talk given at the September conference here of the Northwest Aviation Planning Council by the late Maj. Gen. Oscar Westover who stated that facilities were lagging behind airplane construction.

"This proposal shows that Medford is still in line for an army air base," Mr. Banwell commented.

Councilman Thomas Roseberry read City Superintendent Fred W. Schreffel's October work report which was described by Mayor C. C. Furnas as excellent.

Another report by Mr. Schreffel showed that since the previous council meeting on November 14 additional defective sidewalks had been repaired. The repair work is continuing.

The council voted to cooperate with the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce again this year in decorating the streets for Christmas.

On recommendation of M. N. Hogan, chairman of the license committee, several renewal licenses for 1939 were approved.

### ORDER MOVING OF BY-PRODUCTS CO

In a ruling made Tuesday by J. D. Mickle, head of the dairy and food department of the state department of agriculture, the Southern Oregon By-Products company, is directed to move its plant, located one mile north of Central Point.

A stipulation gives the company 60 days in which to procure a new site and make other arrangements. The company has the right of appeal from the ruling.

In three hearings, residents of the district filed complaints that odors arising from the plant were unhealthy, depreciated the value of their property, and that unsanitary conditions prevailed.

The ruling holds that due to lack of sufficient sewage, and the "hard pan" condition of the ground, it will be impossible to improve the plant so conditions will be entirely satisfactory.

### STATE AG CHIEF TELLS OF DUTIES AT ROTARY MEET

J. M. Mickle, state director of agriculture, explained the functions and aims of the state department of agriculture at a luncheon-meeting of the Medford Rotary club at the Hotel Medford Tuesday.

Duties of state department of agriculture officials are of a regulatory nature, the speaker pointed out. There are five divisions in this state department—administration, marketing, animal industry, plant industry and foods and dairies with checking of weights and measures, enforcement of the gasoline law and varied duties assumed by department members.

Through the work of this department, with federal cooperation, animal and plant diseases have been controlled to a large degree, Oregon holds an enviable position in the nation in this regard, Mr. Mickle said.

Among other activities of the state department of agriculture, as pointed out by Mickle, are: insect control, curbing plant diseases and maintaining quarantines, seed and bulb inspection, inspection of methods of food handling and distribution, grading milk and cream, and safeguarding the standard of export dairy products.

Among interesting facts brought out in Mr. Mickle's address was the volume of eggs shipped annually from Oregon to eastern markets. This volume ranges from 350 to 400 carloads. The operation of "shipping point inspection," now in general use here and elsewhere, was explained by the speaker.

In concluding his interesting address, Mickle lauded activities of the 4-H club and cited this state as one of the leaders in the 4-H movement.
