LEGION DEMANDS BRIDGES ACTION

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 16 (AP)—Stephen P. Chadwick of Seattle, Wash., national commander of the American Legion, demanded of Secretary of Labor Perkins today her department proceed at once with trial of Harry Bridges, west coast director for the committee for industrial organization, on the charge he is an "undesirable alien" and should be deported.

Chadwick made public at a conference of legion department commanders and adjutants a letter he sent to Miss Perkins yesterday. The letter quoted resolutions passed at the legion convention in Los Angeles in September demanding Bridges' deportation and charging labor department officials had failed to enforce deportation laws and blocked passage of new immigration acts. "I have withheld addressing you until the elections were out of the way in order that my this addressing you should not be considered as a matter of political implications," Chadwick's letter said.

OPEN OFFICE HERE FOR O-C MATTERS

Otto C. F. Krueger arrived here today to establish district headquarters for the Oregon-California grant land administration. He was transferred here from the Klamath agency of the U. S. Indian service. He set up a temporary office in city hall. The district office here will handle all O-C matters pertaining to timber sales, grazing and fire protection on the reserved land. JEWS IN GERMANY IN FEAR OF MORE NAZI OUTBREAKS

(Continued from Page One) said the president in a press conference yesterday. Defense Plan Pictured At the same time he pictured a two-continent defense system in which the Americas would present a united front against foreign aggression. His hearers saw a close link between the two statements because of widespread speculation Germany may seek to spread her influence through Latin America. An angry editorial against "concessions of the American government to American Jewry" apparently written before the president's statement in Washington was published by Field Marshal Goering's newspaper in Essen. Leveling its attack chiefly at Secretary Ickes and the calling home of United States Ambassador Hugh R. Wilson, the newspaper said "we in Germany know too well the circles in the United States which answer for such maneuvers to give them much credit." The German-Jewish situation commanded the British cabinet's attention as it awaited Nazi reaction to a plan attributed to United States Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy for an exodus of most of Germany's 800,000 Jews to North and South America and to the British empire.
