Screen Version of Arkansas Traveler on Sunday Program

Among the happiest memories most of us will carry with us are those motion pictures in which Will Rogers and Irene Rich portrayed plain Americans engaged in plain American pursuits.

Everybody who enjoyed these simple dramas of plain folks will enjoy the new Bob Burns picture, "The Arkansas Traveler," which opened its four day showing yesterday at the Craterian theatre. For "The Arkansas Traveler" is in the same channel of the Rogers-Rich appeal, and that speaks volumes.

Bob Burns has been compared, and favorably, with Will Rogers a number of times during the past few years. But it has not been really evident of the similarity between the two as is now shown in this new film. "That will sound like sacrifice to many Rogers fans. But that same down-to-earth, philosophical, human appeal that so characterized Will Rogers is also found in Bob Burns. If this is a sample of what he can really do, then, say we, let's have more of it. For it's been a long time anyone can reach out and touch the heart as Bob Burns does in "The Arkansas Traveler."

He doesn't play the bazooka; he doesn't crack wise about Van Buren and his uncles and aunts and the rest of the relatives he's publicized so much in the past. He just plays a simple, easy-going, drawing, homespun. And when you come right down to it, it really isn't fair to either Will Rogers or Bob Burns to be compared. Rogers had his individual style. Burns has his. But what a happy break that Burns came along after Rogers left such an aching void.

"The Arkansas Traveler" is about a small town, its newspaper and its people. Fay Bainter plays the publisher of the paper covered by the local moneybags. Lyle Talbot, Burns plays a hobo printer who stops in town long enough to outwit the covetous bigwig and patch up a stylized romance between two young folks, played by Jean Parker and John Beal, living the while in a jail cell politely provided by the friendly constable, Irvin S. Cobb.

Jean Hersholt again essays the role of beloved Dr. Luke (Dr. Allan Roy Darrow in real life) in the Dionne quintuplets' third and best starring picture, "Five of a Kind," which opens a three-day run today at the Rialto theatre. 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PARADE, BONFIRE AT 7:10 TONIGHT TO BOOST GAME

With a serpentine through the downtown city streets and a roaring bonfire on the high school grounds, 700 Medford high school students will participate tonight in a pre-game celebration of Friday night's gridiron conflict between Grants Pass and Medford on the local field.

According to plans, the rally will be one of the most enthusiastic and largest pep meetings of the year.

Medford High students will meet at the city park tonight at 7:10 and will form the serpentine from the corner of Main and Holly. The line of march will take the students down Main to the corner of Central and back again. The students will then be dispersed to meet again at the high school field for the lighting of the big bonfire that has been a week in preparation.

The Tiger Guards, Medford Senior high's student police squad, have had charge of the preparation of the bonfire which consists of a collection of old wooden structures, tires, and scrap lumber, surrounded by a towering wooden frame. The torch will be applied to the bonfire at 7:40 tonight.

During the bonfire and the subsequent rally at the bonfire as it burns, Medford high students will sell hot dogs and popcorn to cold and weary pep-makers.

High school cheer leaders, Gretchen McAllister and Bob Walker, will lead the yells during both serpentine and bonfire rally. Nearly the entire high school student body is expected to participate.

The Senior high school drum corps will make a marching appearance in Medford's downtown district between 2:30 and 3:00 Friday afternoon.

PARIS POLICE HALT RED DEMONSTRATION

PARIS, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A group of about 2,000 persons, who police said were mostly Communists, today staged the first demonstration against Premier Daladier's decree laws.

Strong forces of police broke up the demonstration in Place D'Italie, in the heart of the Paris workers' district, without difficulty.

Seven persons were arrested charged with obstructing traffic.

The crowd also opposed a government ban on a Communist meeting that had been scheduled tonight.
