

REPORTS FILED ON CAMPAIGN COSTS

SALEM, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Associated Employers of Oregon, Inc., spent \$1219 in support of the initiative to regulate picketing and boycotting, while the Portland Industrial Union council spent \$880 to fight the same measure.

The committee supporting District Attorney James R. Bain of Multnomah county for reelection spent \$2068.

Emily F. Edson, Democratic candidate for secretary of state, reported expenditures of \$181. Clarence F. Hyde, Democrat, candidate for state labor commissioner, spent \$311.

The Salem teachers' forum for Superintendent club contributed \$12. Hall S. Lusk, unopposed candidate for state supreme court, and W. E. Burke, Republican candidate for state senator in the 10th district, spent nothing. Burke's Democratic opponent, Alfred J. French, spent \$39.

DEATH RECOMMENDED FOR YOUNG MURDERER

WALLA WALLA, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A superior court jury last night convicted Earl Talbot, 18, of first degree murder and recommended that he pay with his life for the shooting of W. E. McKinney, farmer, near Walburg, August 9. No time for passing sentence was fixed by the court.

One of the final defense witnesses, Dr. Edward E. Hoedemaker, Seattle psychiatrist, said Talbot was suffering from a lack of emotional response and a condition which may lead to severe mental illness later. He said from a medical standpoint Talbot was abnormal, from a legal standpoint he was competent and able to tell right from wrong.

GRAND JURY MAY EYE LOSS OF MAN'S ARM

ALBANY, Nov. 17.—(AP)—District Attorney J. K. Weatherford, Jr., said yesterday he might submit to a grand jury Monday investigation of an accident which fatally injured Hans Muller, 49, of Foster.

Muller died Tuesday following amputation of his arm, which was mangled Sunday when his overcoat sleeve caught in the door handle of an automobile which passed him as he walked along the South Santiam highway. The automobile was driven by Oscar Plunkett, Sweet Home.

Weatherford said that the grand jury would investigate the loss of Muller's arm.

WING INCREASES GUERNSEY HERD

Charles A. Wing's Golden Guernsey herd today was augmented by four registered Guernsey cows purchased from well-known farms near Portland.

The additional cows were needed, Mr. Wing said, to meet the demand for premium milk from his Cloverhill dairy on the Old Stage road. The purchase increased the Cloverhill herd to 55 head of registered Guernseys, 35 of them producing cows.

Two of the new cows were bought from the M. C. Fleming herd and two from the O'Donnell ranch, both situated near Portland. The two bought from the Fleming herd are of the Kendall strain of which strain one cow is now making a world's record, Mr. Wing related.

The purchases, Mr. Wing pointed out, bring a new strain of registered Guernseys to southern Oregon. Bull calves from the Wing herd are sold in eastern Oregon and northern California.

A new calf barn on the Cloverhill ranch has just been completed, Mr. Wing said. It is modern even to having a hospital room, he stated.

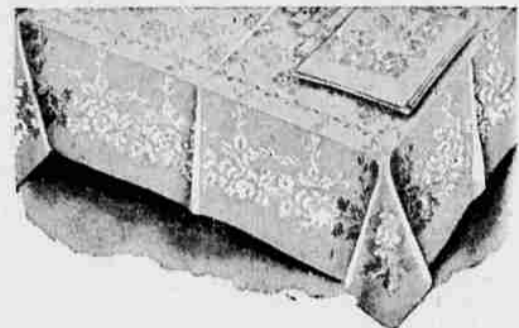
Coos Co. Has Coal

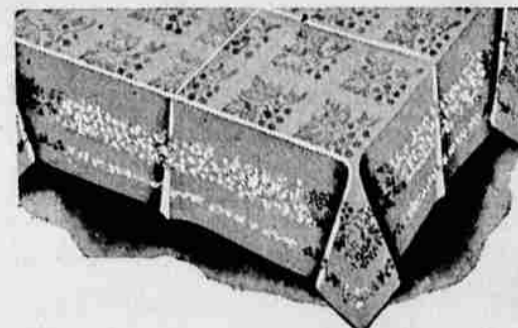

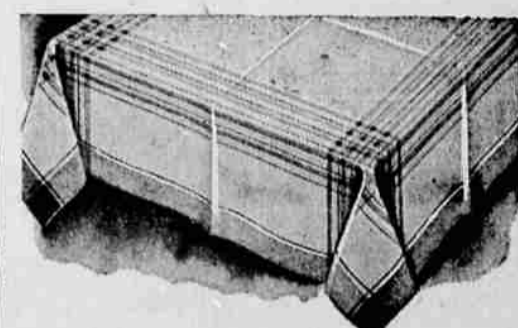
