

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT WILL TAKE HUGE SUM

PORTLAND, Nov. 17.—(AP)—More than \$4,250,000 will be spent in Oregon during the next year and a half to construct or improve school buildings, the regional PWA office revealed today.

Approximately 42 per cent of the 142 Oregon projects were devoted to schools. The government's share was estimated at \$2,282,950. The total construction value of all projects was about \$10,000,000. The work also included 22 municipal buildings, 19 highway projects, eight bridges, 15 water systems, three hospitals, three dock improvements, three sewage systems and 13 miscellaneous works. NEW MAGAZINE OF NATIONAL SCOPE IS LAUNCHED HERE

"Thought, The Voice of Man the Immortal," a new monthly magazine to circulate nationally, was launched this week here in Medford and will be printed and published regularly here, beginning with its Christmas number.

"It will deal with the dreams, the hopes, the aspirations and faith of right-thinking men and women; and with the reaching forward to better, nobler things," says Iri Morse, its editor-in-chief. "Its objective being the restoration of the Creator of the Universe to the minds and thought of all men; the restoration of man as above the weird gloom, despond and ultimate obliteration in process of discovery by popular half-thinkers paraded before the nation today; half-thinkers who would make animals and beasts of men, with only pseudo-scientific conjectures as a basis for so doing. We are, in short, determined to replace the highly modernized Slough of Despond with the Sunrise of the Soul."

"The new monthly magazine," says Mr. Morse, "is not concerned with cult, sect or creed. It will present thought of a positive, rather than of a defensive or argumentative nature, bringing men back to their natural impulses, aspirations and beliefs. It is also giving full and daily support to the history-making and most outstanding book, 'Sunrise of the Soul,' an elaborately illustrated beautification of the principal precepts of the Bible, in process of creation by the nationally-known and able poet, Freeman Chase Leslie; a book which utilizes the finest thought and instinctive, fundamental feeling of right-thinking people of the nation, whether their occupation or calling, and principally the representatives of Christ and expositors of His teachings and precepts."

The publishing, as well as all the art work, is to be done here at Medford, which will keep Mr. Morse here pending the mailing of the first Christmas number, if not longer. He will then leave for Portland, where the main editorial offices are located.

OREGON LEGION SETS ENROLLMENT RECORD

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 17.—(AP)—A paid up 1938 Oregon membership of 5489 broke American Legion pre-enrollment records by about 1000, John A. Beckwith of Portland, state department commander, reported today at a national conference.

The national organization said its enrollment of 532,000 members prior to the new year drive was 100,000 more than previous showings.

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 17.—(AP)—Phillip A. Benson, Brooklyn, N. Y., today was elected president of the American Bankers' association to succeed Orval W. Adams, Salt Lake City, Utah.

Robert M. Hanes, Winston-Salem, N. C., was elected first vice-president and P. D. Houston, Nashville, Tenn., won the second vice-presidency.

The three officers were elected unanimously.

Houston, who had been opposed by W. Laird Dean, Topeka, Kas., and Frank P. Powers, Mora, Minn., was the choice of the convention's nominating committee. Dean offered the motion closing the nominations for the position. Houston is slated to become president of the ABA in 1940.

OSTRACISM SUGGESTED TO HALT GERMANY IN ANTI-JEW ACTIVITIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Senator Logan (D-Ky.) suggested today the United States and other American republics join England, France and other nations in "ostracizing Germany" to force an end to anti-Jewish activities.

"This seems to be about the only way to bring a cray man to his senses," the Kentucky senator said, adding he did not believe the German people as a group approved Hitler's program, and eventually would end it themselves. Other congressional comment warmly approved President Roosevelt's condemnation of the recent German anti-Jewish moves and applauded his action in calling this country's ambassador to Germany home for conferences.

Senator Bailey (D-N.C.) said "What's going on in Germany is unspeakable and I wish I could think a protest by our country would arrest that cruelty." The North Carolina senator said "The same thing happened in Russia, only it was worse. They destroyed millions of people in Russia—starved many of them."

"Both Germany and Russia should illustrate to the American people the value of our constitution and the right of a citizen to go to the courts to get justice."

JEW COPS TO PROTECT VISITING NAZI NABOBS

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Hereafter when prominent Nazi Germans visit New York they will be guarded by a police squad headed by Capt. Max Finkelstein, president of the Shomrim society, Jewish organization of the police department.

Lieut. Jacob Licker and Sgt. Isaac Goldstein, also Jewish, will be Captain Finkelstein's mainstays. The order to have Jewish policemen protect the Nazis, as well as to guard the German consulate at 17 Battery place was issued, it was understood at police headquarters, after a conference between Mayor La Guardia and Police Commissioner Lewis J. Valentine.

MAN ONCE 'DEAD' OF AUTO SMASHUP INJURY TO BECOME BENEDICT

ABERDEEN, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Two years ago doctors pronounced Theodore Prinz clinically dead. Yesterday, in Montezuma, he obtained a marriage license.

Thus started another chapter in the life of the man who left the land of the living for a full five minutes following an automobile wreck in which he was badly injured two years ago—and lived to tell about it. His bride will be Jane Morris, a resident of Pacific Beach.

January 20, 1937, Theodore Prinz' heart and lung action stopped completely, and there were no other signs of life in his body, which had been severely crushed in a car crash. Doctors injected adrenalin into his heart in what they thought was a futile effort to revive him. To their amazement, after a full five minutes in the valley of the shadow, the man lived again, and within a few weeks was up and about.

He once described his experience as a journey "into a deep peacefulness and a rich contentment, where there was no fear and no worry."
