LEWIS IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF CIO

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 18.—(AP)—John L. Lewis was elected first president of the Congress of Industrial Organizations today, after a 28-minute tumultuous demonstration by 500 delegates representing some 3,000,000 workers in more than 40 national and international unions. Hugh Thompson of Buffalo, a CIO regional director, moved the nominations be closed and Lewis was elected unanimously. Responding, Lewis said: "This marks my transition from the role of a dictator to the role of a servant of a constitutional democracy. What a change for a dictator. 'Your servant I am and proudly so.'"
