Fall Ceremonial to Open at 2 P. M. With Registry of Novices—Parade, Feast and Jamboree Features

Nobles of Hillah Temple in fez and colorful garb, will invade the sacred domain of the Caveman Saturday and hold a fall ceremonial at Grants Pass under the leadership of Illustrious Potentate Austin B. Brownell. The spacious Josephine county fair grounds buildings have been selected for this colorful affair and a program complete in every detail has been planned under the able supervision of General Chairman G. A. Nunn.

The ceremonial program will be launched at 2:00 p. m. when quaking novices will be registered by Recorder R. E. Detrick at the pavilion building. TWO NAVY PILOTS DIE WHEN HUGE PLANE HITS HONOLULU BOATHOUSE

HONOLULU, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Two navy pilots were killed and five others injured last night when one of the VP-10 squadron bombers which pioneered the navy's mass flights across the Pacific crashed into a boathouse at the Pearl Harbor fleet air base during an attempted landing.

Instantly killed when the front end of the bomber was smashed in were Lieutenant Junior grade, P. H. Ashworth, 30, of Wenham, Mass., and aviation cadet J. W. Beam of Bardonia, Ky.

Lieut. Comdr. A. R. Brady, 40, executive officer of the squadron, was taken to the naval hospital to be treated for shock and submersion. Commander Brady is a native of Fernandina, Fla.

The others were only slightly hurt and did not require hospitalization. They were in the bomber's after part, which was not so extensively damaged.

A naval board of inquiry was to convene today to investigate the crash, which occurred while the plane with seven other bombers, was practicing takeoffs and landings on floodlighted, calm Pearl harbor channel.

Unique Hand Loom For Rug Making Is Featured by Mann's

A new gadget for rug-making at home is a little hand loom on display at Mann's Department store Saturday. The mechanism, and various samples of its work are being demonstrated by Mrs. Mabel Baldwin of Hollywood, Calif., who is an expert at this new bit of "fancy work". She says both rug-making and rugs themselves are popular in the movie city, and that many of the cinema stars are customers of her company.

The Persian knot is used in weaving with this loom. Mrs. Baldwin explained. It is the same used by Oriental rug makers in weaving their lovely, expensive rugs. However, one needn't plan on a lifetime's endeavor to produce a rug, because the new loom turns out a finished product in a remarkably short time. The Oriental girl, who serves her apprenticeship and becomes a professional, does nothing further but weave on the rug assigned her. Least she mar her fingers, and hinder her work with the fine silk employed, everything is done for her, even to the tying of her shoes. The idea, says Mrs. Baldwin, has possibilities, but she hastened to assure that the present hand loom does not require such meticulous care in operation, nor such expensive materials.
