

TRADE PACTS GIVE COAST INDUSTRIES IMPORTANT HELP

Agriculture and Lumber Due to Benefit From New Agreement On Trading With Britain and Canada

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(AP)—United States fruit and vegetable producers gained a more favorable position in the British markets today.

Under provisions of treaties executed with Canada and the United Kingdom, export duties on certain of their products were reduced substantially or "pegged" at their present levels.

These concessions were granted with few return concessions to British agricultural products.

The lowered duties, officials said, would "substantially" restore United States apple exports to Great Britain, improve markets for the fruit in Canada and probably increase the movement of pears abroad.

Under the treaty with the United Kingdom, the present duty of 4 shillings, sixpence, a 100 pounds of apples would be dropped to a flat 3 shillings between August 16-April 15, when the bulk of the American crop moved into the market.

In the Canadian treaty duties on specified quotas of United States apples were cut from 1.5 cents to 1.5 cents a pound.

American pears received treatment similar to apples under both treaties, the duty on shipments into the United Kingdom being cut from 4 shillings, sixpence, to 3 shillings a hundredweight, and on quota shipments of apples to Canada reduced from 22 to 14 cents.

Both apples and pears were dutiable at 4 shillings sixpence a hundredweight in the markets of the United Kingdom after November, 1932, while the same fruits of empire origin remained duty free.

Apples Hurt Lately
As a result of this "empire preference," British orders for American apples dwindled until, during the past few years, the United States supplied only between 18 and 32 per cent. instead of about 50 per cent. of the United Kingdom's demand.

British imports of American pears, however, increased somewhat during the period, due largely to the lack of supply within the empire.

An important feature of the Canadian treaty involves potatoes. In return for a Canadian concession which permits the United States to ship potatoes into the dominion market duty free, except between June 15 and July 31, this country agreed to raise the quota of seed potatoes which might be shipped into the United States under lower tariff rates and also to lower the rates.

Under the treaty the old low rate of 45 cents a hundred pounds was reduced to 37 1/2 cents and the quota of seed potato imports which this rate would apply to was raised from 750,000 to 1,500,000 bushels. After 1,500,000 bushels, the regular duty of 75 cents a hundred pounds goes into effect.

Canned Goods Helped
The treaty with the United Kingdom effects slight reductions in canned apples, both with and without sugar strip, and canned loganberries, fruit salad and cherries.

The present British duties on American raisins, dried prunes and apricots, canned tomato, pineapple and prune juice and canned peaches, pears and apricots are bound against increase by terms of the United Kingdom agreement.

The treaty halves the 30 per cent duty on American asparagus and canned sweet corn shipped into the United Kingdom, and guarantees the present 20 per cent duty on canned beans will not be increased.

Virtually all American fruits and vegetables received tariff reductions in the Canadian agreement.

Among the products involved in straight duty reductions was grapes. The United States shipped nearly \$1,000,000 worth into Canada last year and paid a duty of 1.5 cents a pound. The new duty will be but 1 cent.

Lemons Duty Free
Under the old trade agreements oranges had been duty-free into Canada from January through April, but the new pact makes December entries free and with optional change by Canadian decision to a period January through July. The Canadian agreement removed the excise tax of 3 per cent a cubic foot and the grapefruit duty at a half cent a pound. Lemons continued duty free.

LAST BRADY GANGSTER TAKES ELECTRIC CHAIR FOR SLAYING OFFICER

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., Nov. 18.—(AP)—The last gangster of the Al Brady mob of mid-western killers, once described as the worst in the country, died in a swift and efficient federal execution here today.

Little red-haired James Dalhove of Madison, 32-year-old gunman for the gang, paid in state prison's electric chair for the slaying of Paul W. Minneman, Loganport state policeman, shot after the \$2500 Goodland State Bank robbery May 25, 1937.

His death was as quick as, but more quiet than those of his fellow mobsters, Alfred Brady and Clarence Lee Shaffer, Jr. of Indianapolis. Federal agents shot them when they captured Dalhove in Bangor, Me., October 12, 1937.

In nine brief minutes, just after midnight, the condemned man was hustled from the death cell between two guards, strapped in the chair and electrocuted. Physicians pronounced him dead at 11 minutes after 12 (CST).

That ended the career of a gang once termed by J. Edgar Hoover, federal bureau of investigation chief, the "most vicious" in the United States. Brady and his henchmen boasted they would "make John Dillinger look like a piker." They were blamed for three killings.
