

GIBSON FACING SECOND CHARGE ON BAD CHECKS

O. L. Gibson, stock buyer, held in the county jail under \$300 bonds, faced a second preliminary hearing today on a check charge, with Ernest Dahack of Eagle Point, as the complaining witness.

Gibson was cited in justice court Thursday on complaint of Mrs. A. C. Fernald of Lake Creek, who alleged the defendant had given a \$30 check with insufficient funds in the Ashland branch bank of the First National Bank of Portland. No decision was given.

Dahack alleges Gibson cashed a check for \$30 at his place, for which there were no funds.

AFL HEAD URGES GERMAN BOYCOTT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—(AP)—William Green, president, called on the American Federation of Labor today to "redouble efforts" to make effective the federation's five-year-old boycott against German goods and service.

He asked this as evidence of the federation's opposition to the treatment of Jews in Germany.

Green sent a letter to all AFL affiliates, saying the United States laboring man should make his resentment known, "in a vital and striking way."

"It is not enough to protest," he declared. "We must supplement protest with action."

PORTLAND, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The highway commission petitioned the Indian service today to provide more sanitary and slightly conditions at the Celilo Indian village on the Columbia river for the benefits of tourists.

It also revealed work on the Abernathy bridge-Tenth street section of the super highway at Oregon City would be advertised next summer. About \$30,000 has been appropriated for work on a Benton county section of the Kings valley secondary road.
