BOWL SELECTIONS BRING CRITICISMS FROM OLD BLUES

Los Angeles Writers Accuse Trojans of Passing Up Horned Frogs to Get Softer Touch of Duke

With most of the dates made, the battle of the bowls went merrily on today. Comment on the various selections and guesses on the outcome of the game has given the old blues more cannon fodder than they have had in years.

The better box office draws already have been selected.

The lineup for January 2: Rose Bowl, Pasadena, Calif.—Duke, Southern Conference champion vs. Southern California, tied for Pacific Coast Conference title.

Sugar Bowl, New Orleans—Texas Christian, Southwest Conference title, vs. Carnegie Tech.

Cotton Bowl, Dallas—Texas Tech vs. Villanova—If Villanova decides to accept.

Orange Bowl, Miami—Tennessee, Southeastern Conference champion, vs. Oklahoma, Big Six champion.

Sun Bowl, El Paso—New Mexico, and probably Utah, Mountain States Conference champion.

Coal Bowl, Charleston, W. Va.—Unheard of since Carnegie Tech turned down a bid.

Prize Bowl (don't say you weren't warned) San Jose, Calif.—San Jose State vs. Memphis Teachers. This one's set for December 22.

Eastern Bowl, New York—Off. See the New York weather report.

Other operations: East-West all star game, San Francisco, and North-South all star game at Montgomery, Ala.

In the old days they used to just pick 'em and play 'em. Now they pick the selections apart. The Los Angeles sports writers are panning Duke's selection and there is mild indignation in Texas that the Christians, the state's pride, will gambol outside the state.

Main complaint in Los Angeles seems to be the Trojans turned down a chance to get Texas Christian for Duke. One writer reported the tournament of roses officials were definitely inclined toward the Horned Frogs and Duke "features a heroic but far from spectacular stonewall defense," and added Southern California was letting itself in for "dirty cracks about 'picking somebody who is pretty sure not to do much scoring'."

All this probably will be solved by the astute Wallace Wade of Duke to whip his boys up to a fine lather of revenge against the Trojans. Wade is adept at pointing his team for a single game and all this won't hurt at all.

MOUNTAIN BOYS ON COMING CARD

The Arkansas Scuffers, nationally known trio of brothers direct from the Ozark mountains, will feature next Monday night's wrestling program in the Medford arena, meeting three of Promoter Mack Lillard's current crop of torso-wrestlers. Opponents for the Scuffers will be named tomorrow, the promo stated.

The brothers, who have been touring the nation for the past few years taking on all comers, are bewhiskered fellows and considered one of the greatest grappling attractions in the world. Their names are Tuffy, Tony and Mike Jones. Tuffy weighs 195, Tony tips the scales at 205 and Mike is 185 pounds heavy.

Stiner to Stay

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Lon Stiner, Oregon State college's head football coach, has accepted a three-year contract, the athletic control board announced today.

The board said the contract would become effective next July 1, and that Stiner would be given a "substantial salary increase," beginning January 1, 1939.

Stiner said he had accepted, concurring upon approval by the college president and the state board of higher education. His present salary is \$6500 annually. He has worked without a contract on a year-to-year basis during his six-year tenure.

Officials refused to divulge the amount of the salary increase.

TIGERS DATED UP FOR 17 GAMES ON BASKET SCHEDULE

Medford high's Tiger basketball team will play 17 games against major opponents during the 1938-39 season, eight of these contests being district 9 encounters with Ashland and Grants Pass for the right to enter the state tournament at Salem, according to the official schedule released today by Coach Russ Acneson.

In addition to the district games, the Medfords will face Klamath Falls three times in Southern Oregon playoffs which have no bearing on the state tournament representative, as the Pellans are members of another state district. The locals will also meet Salem three times, Crescent City, Cal. twice, and University high of Eugene once.

Tornado, Under Bowerman Reign, Has Great Mark

This being the time of year, with the season practically ended except for the various "bowl" games, when grid fans like to pore over the records of their favorite teams and football writers delight in spinning typewritten yarns regarding the past performance of said aggregations, we might as well get in on the fun and present the achievement of a gridiron machine which, during the past four years, has produced a record we'll wager is one of the five finest in the state.

We give you Medford high school's Black Tornado, coached by Bill Bowerman, with the 1938 edition considered by scores of local fans as the greatest Tiger club since the golden days of Prink Callison in the 1920's. It was four years ago that Bowerman took over the reins at his alma mater here, and what a great coaching job he has done. Over that span of seasons, Medford has:

Won three Southern Oregon conference titles.
Lost only one conference game while winning nine.
Won 35, lost 6 and tied 4 for a total game percentage of 79.3.
Scored 608 points against 293 for opponents.

Twice laid serious and logical claim to a share of the mythical state championship.

Briefly, these are the highlights of the Tigers' four-year record under the mentorship of Bill Bowerman. Of course, that record can't match the almost unbelievable string of undefeated seasons enjoyed by the Tornado while Callison was at the helm, but until another football dynasty like that is born, which will be NEVER, this four-year mark of Bowerman's teams will do for anybody's money.

The greatest achievement of Medford teams under the Bowerman regime, we believe, is their record in the Southern Oregon conference. Only in 1936 did the Tornado fail to win the crown, and that was because Bob Olson was declared ineligible after the Tigers had beaten Grants Pass, 31 to 7, and Medford subsequently forfeited the game to the Cavemen to give them the title. In 1935, 1937 and this season, the Black Tornado crashed through to the conference pennant without the loss of a game, and only one tie, that with Klamath Falls, 0 to 0, in 1937. The only defeat suffered by Medford from a conference team in those four years was at the hands of Klamath Falls in 1936, 0 to 3. That same year, Ashland tied the Tigers, 6 to 6.

So, in conference action, which is what really counts, after all, the Bowermanites won 9 games, lost a mere 1 and tied 2 for a percentage of .900. You could hardly ask for a better showing than that.

In piling up 608 points to their opponents 293 in 33 games played against all opposition, the Tigers have averaged better than 18 points, or three touchdowns, per encounter, to their opponents 8 plus markers, or practically one touchdown per battle. Their conference scoring average is 168 points in 12 games to their opponents 30, or 14 points per game to their opponents 4 plus.

To leave cold statistics for a moment, these past four campaigns have seen Medford win 30 games, tie one and lose one to Klamath Falls, win three and tie one with Ashland, and win four on the gridiron from Grants Pass, those teams being conference opponents. Outside the league, the Tigers have walloped Roseburg four times, beaten Marshfield twice, taken two out of three games from Eugene, won one and

lost one with Salem, beaten Chemawa once, split even in two games with Bend, lost one and tied one with Hood River, copped one and lost two with Eureka and beaten Weed once.

Only in 1935, Bowerman's first season here, were the Tigers undefeated. That year they romped through seven straight games with ease, but great as that team was, the mentor considers the aggregation which just hung up its suits the finest he has ever coached. "This year's team was better than any other," Bill explained, "because of its fighting spirit and high morale at all times."

So, such is the record of Medford's Tigers under the direction of Bill Bowerman; three grand seasons out of four; a record of which every student, fan, player and the coach himself, can well be proud. We wish Bill and Medford high many more of those sparkling campaigns, and be assured that we are not alone in that wish. Here is the year by year won and lost record, with Tiger points and opponents' markers:
