JAS. W. GILLMORE SUCCEUMBS IN C. P.

SET VALUATION ON OREGON PROPERTY

SALEM, Dec. 2.—(AP)—The assessed valuation of all property in Oregon was estimated by the state tax commission today at \$740,477,040, or slightly more than \$200,000,000 less than the record of 10 years ago.

"There is nothing to indicate that property locally assessed is likely to regain any great part of the over \$200,000,000 lost during depression years," the commission said.

The total assessment is 1/4 of one per cent more than two years ago, low point of the depression. Utility valuations amount to \$158,928,188, an increase of 1.6 per cent in two years.

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FIRE BOYS NEED MORE OLD TOYS TO FIX FOR KIDS

An urgent call was issued today by the fire department for more old and discarded toys.

At the same time the Lady Lions club issued a plea for more old dolls. To facilitate contributions the club has placed barrels at Woolworth's, Humphrey's grocery, Mann's department store, Safeway store on West Main street and the M. M. department store. The discarded dolls may be dropped in the barrels. The old dolls are re-dressed by the Lady Lions who work in cooperation with the fire department in distributing reconstructed toys to poor children at Christmas.

The old toys may be left at fire headquarters or they will be called for by the Lady Lions if the department is notified by telephoning 849.

"The contribution of old and discarded toys has fallen off and we need a lot more so that we shall have enough to bring Christmas cheer to all the underprivileged children of the district," said Chief Roy Elliott. "Time is needed to reconstruct and repaint the toys and it would be appreciated if donations were made now. We are trying to avoid a rush at the last minute when there is not enough time to do a good job."

The firemen give their time gratis in reconstructing the old playthings. They have a complete workshop where the toys are made to look like new. But if the work is to be done properly and if all the poor children of the district are to benefit, the discarded toys must be received in larger volume without further delay, Chief Elliott said.


