Miss Marcia Van Dyke, violinist, will be featured soloist at the opening concert of the Southern Oregon Symphony orchestra, to be given Wednesday, December 14, under direction of Mr. John R. Knight, and sponsorship of Zonta International club of Medford.

Miss Van Dyke is a former member of the orchestra and lived in Grants Pass until two years ago when she moved with her parents to Burlington, Cal., so that she might study with Mr. Blunder, conductor of the San Francisco Symphony orchestra. Miss Van Dyke will bring with her, Mr. Henry Tresger, a young pianist of unusual ability, as accompanist.

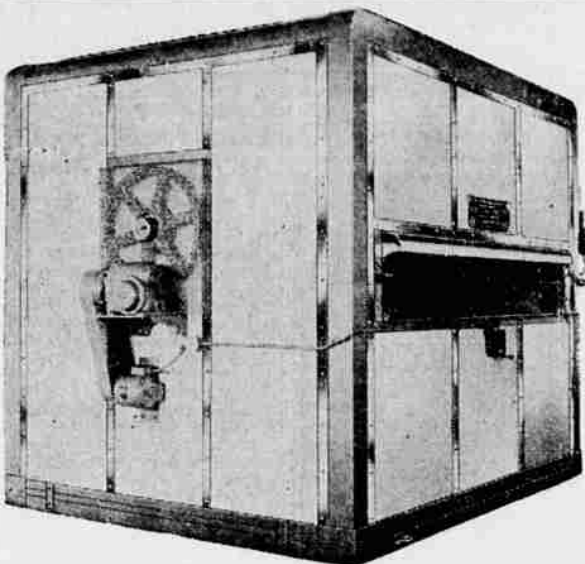
The featured violinist will play Romance, from the second concerto by Wieniawski, with the orchestra.

RAINS, FOG, SNOW OVER COAST AREA HIT AIR FLIGHTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Rains, snow and fog covered coast areas from Northern California to the Pacific Northwest and inland today, causing cancellation of passenger plane flight north and east from San Francisco.

Regular air schedules were maintained toward Southern California where weather conditions were more moderate. Planes were grounded at Salt Lake City rather than hazard the last-leg flight to San Francisco over the storm area.

Pacific Northwest points reported winds which neared hurricane force there yesterday had subsided, but the forecast was for continued rain and snow over the week-end.

Wettest spots in California apparently wasureka where 3.30 inches of rain fell in 24 hours, during a constant 48-hour precipitation. Rivers in Humboldt county were rising and highways were flooded.

Redding received 2.86 inches of rain, but valley areas south of Sacramento were not so heavily drenched and there was little precipitation in San Joaquin valley.

Intermittent rainfall was forecast for the week-end in Northern California, with snow in the Sierra. R. C. Counts, government meteorologist, said another disturbance 600 miles offshore may bring another storm tomorrow night.

FINLAND TO PAY DEBT OBLIGATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Finland notified the State Department today that as usual it would make its semi-annual debt payment to the United States on December 15.

Only Finland of the 13 European nations whose debts to this government have been swollen by interest to some \$13,000,000 since the World War, has met its obligations without a default.

Finland's December 15 installment totals \$232,948. Eero Järnefelt, the Finnish minister, notified acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles that the sum would be turned over to the federal reserve bank in New York City.

JOHN ROOSEVELT'S WIFE'S SISTER IS EXCITING BRIDE

BOSTON, Dec. 3.—(AP)—As 2000 persons—half of them uninvited—watched an impressive ceremony, pretty Sally Poor Clark, sister of Mrs. John A. Roosevelt, and wealthy George X. McLanahan, 26, of New York, were married today in fashionable Emmanuel church.

The 18-year-old second daughter of Mrs. F. Haven Clark, gowning in a flowing white velvet dress, quietly pronounced her marital vows in the 20-minute, single ring, Episcopal

ceremony. At its close, the bride and groom knelt for a blessing and then swept down the aisle to the door.

Mrs. Clark had invited 1000 guests to the high-noon wedding. Also, she announced the door of the church would not be locked while her daughter was being wed and approximately 1000 more men and women swarmed into the building.

As Mr. and Mrs. McLanahan left the church, there was a brief swirl of confusion in which a spectator grabbed the bouquet of one of the bridesmaids. The newly-wedded couple, however, sped away unharmed to a reception at the home of Sally's aunt, Mrs. George Clymer.

They planned to leave by train for New York after the reception. Thence they will go to California and to Hawaii for a honeymoon.

PENNEY MANAGER BACK FROM TRIP

Ray Baker, returning yesterday morning from the J. C. Penney company junior convention for managers held in Portland Thursday, Friday and Saturday, said it was clearly brought out at the meeting that business conditions were improving rapidly and that people seemed to be spending more freely now than at any time during the past several months. He stated that most J. C. Penney stores were showing heartening increases in business, and that eastern units were all on the upgrade.

Mr. Baker, manager of the Medford J. C. Penney store, said that market prices had been stabilized and were very firm. The local unit, he said, compared favorably with other Oregon stores in the business increase.

Attended by 40 managers of stores in Oregon and southwestern Washington, the convention was held for the purpose of buying stock for the company's 38th anniversary to be observed in March. Discussion of store problems and operations was also held, he explained.

URGUE WIDESPREAD USE XMAS SEALS

An appeal for widespread use of the Christmas seal, which finances the annual drive against tuberculosis in Jackson county, was made yesterday by the local committee with release of a list of suggested ways in which to keep the cheery little stamp in public view.

The list reads: On all greeting cards. On packages to foreign countries. On all Christmas greeting cards. On bridge tables and place cards at parties this month. On church calendars. On bills and business letters. On programs. On correspondence cards and packages. As Christmas tree decorations. As part of a stamp collection.

PARDONING POWER CHANGE PLANNED

SALEM, Dec. 3.—(AP)—A move to take the power of pardoning away from the governor and put it in a combined state parole and probation commission was proposed today at a meeting of a special committee named by Gov. Charles H. Martin to study the problem.

The step would enable the governor to dispense with many hearings necessitated on pardon matters and would put the action in the hands of a group who would have ample time to consider cases. The program will be recommended to the 1939 legislature.

The committee, headed by Dean Wayne L. Morse of the University of Oregon, also proposed that all parole eligibility restrictions be eliminated and the committee given the power to set up uniform regulations. The program calls for abolishment of the present state parole board.
