

Trojans Upset Notre Dame 13 to 0 in Bitter Battle Before 101,000

JUDGMENT ERROR AND FUMBLE NET TROY TOUCHDOWNS

Both Teams Miss Chance To Score—Air Attack On Notre Dame Fails To Click.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Notre Dame came tumbling off football's highest peak today, knocked down for the first time this year by Southern California, the Rose bowl hopes of the far west, in a savage game that ended in a 13 to 0 victory for the Trojans before a record crowd of 101,000.

Beaten twice this year but determined to carry no more defeats into the Rose bowl against Duke January 2, the Warriors of Troy upset the Notre Dame hopes in two lightning-like thrusts that spelled gloom for the Irish.

Coach Howard Jones' eleven scored the first touchdown in the fading moments of the first half after the Irish had gambled for a first down in midfield and lost, and hammered the Notre Dame defense 35 yards after recovering a fumble late in the fourth period.

It was the thirteenth annual struggle between these two intercollegiate foes, and the courageous lads from South Bend went into the game on the crest of eight victorious games, Minnesota, Northwestern, Army, Navy and all the others on one of the toughest schedules in the land had surrendered to the Irish forces, but Troy refused to bend.

Packed in the Coliseum was the biggest Los Angeles crowd of the colorful Notre Dame-U. S. C. series. It rivaled the huge throngs that saw the game in Chicago in 1929.

Keyed up to a pitch of excitement, both eleven missed scoring opportunities for the first part of the battle. Then came another opportunity for the so-called Notre Dame opportunists. But Bob Saggau, the splendid Irish sophomore half star, who tried to make three yards on fourth down, missed by one yard on the Irish 35.

The Trojans took the ball and Ollie Day, a reserve, trotted into the S. C. backfield. Two plays later, with the ball on the 37, Day sailed a pass into the arms of Al Krueger, hard-socking sophomore end. He took it on the six and fell across the line with a Notre Dame tackle, apparently Zontal, clutching his ankles. Phil Gaspar missed the conversion and 35 seconds later the half ended.

The Irish came out battling after the rest, but so did the Trojans. They were without their star quarterback, Grenville Lansell, who left the game in the first quarter with a twisted ankle, but Day, Anderson, Banta, Jones and a few other lesser lights were carrying on the battle.

The second break for S. C. came with about 10 minutes of the fourth period left. Joe Piepul fumbled and Jimmy Jones came up with the ball for Troy on the Irish 35.

Two plays—crash!—Troy's second touchdown. Gaspar's conversion was successful this time, and there was the score, 13 to 0.

Notre Dame wasn't through trying, however. Saggau, after the kickoff, reeled off 21, Tonelli added up several yards, Saggau passed 13 yards to Steve Sitko, and Notre Dame reached the Trojan 14, first down.

Two passes fell incomplete as the Trojan ends piled in on Saggau, and the third drive was intercepted by Bob Peoples, sub fullback, who ran it back 23 yards. It was the Irish's last chance.

The Irish outgained the Trojans on running plays, 145 yards to 98, but the combined passing and running of the Trojan team brought the edge to Troy by 151 yards to 143.

In the first period the Irish drove from midfield to the Trojan 22, but lost the ball on downs as the Trojan aerial defense swamped the Irish passes.

Early in the second quarter Notre Dame's Morrison fumbled and Gaspar got the ball on the Irish 21, but two plays later the Trojans fumbled, and Morrison recovered.

Booked back and forth, Troy seemed up a drive of 33 yards that carried to the Irish 16, but Gaspar's try for a field goal from the 23 was wide.

The result left Notre Dame winner of seven games in the series, U. S. C. five, with one tied. Notre Dame's first chance in eight years for an undefeated, untied season was stopped by Troy's best team in five years.

SOUTH METHODIST BEATEN BY RICE USING AIR ATTACK

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Ernie Laine and Ollie Cordill found themselves and each other today in the last game of the Southwest conference season and led Rice institute to a 25-14 upset victory over Southern Methodist university, league runners-up to Texas Christian.

The pressure was off—for the game meant practically nothing in the final conference standings—and Laine heaved two touchdown passes to Cordill. Cordill scored a third and E. Y. Steakley, a senior speed merchant, snatched another of Laine's passes for the fourth touchdown.

Laine pitched and Cordill caught for much of the Rice yardage.

Rice showed the potential power the critics gave it before the season opened, marching 84 yards for its first touchdown. Cordill smashed over from the two-yard line.

Southern Methodist put the ball in play on its own 20, shoved it down to the Rice 39 as the first period ended and on the fourth play of the second period, Gerald Geise threw a mighty pass from the Rice 35 to Billy Dewell, sub end, who snagged the ball in an almost impossible catch and fell over the goal line.

Rice took the kickoff, ran it back to its own 22 and by passing and ramming the line, worked it down to the S.M.U. 22, where Laine pitched a perfect pass to Cordill who scampered over for Rice's second marker.

The Mustangs took a 14-13 half-time lead on a long drive climaxed by Ray Mallouf's touchdown pass to Robert Baccus.

In the final period Rice intercepted two of Johnny Clement's passes to pave the way for two touchdowns.

PARK DORMITORY AT CRATER LAKE OPEN FOR SKIERS

New accommodations, including overnight facilities, for sportmen in Crater Lake national park were announced by E. P. Leavitt, superintendent.

Overnight accommodations will be provided for about 20 men and women in the dormitory at a nominal charge. Mr. Leavitt said, Mattresses will be furnished but each guest must provide his or her own bedding, he related. All the sanitary facilities of the building will be available for guest use, he added.

Members of the winter park staff are using the dormitory and to attain success for the new plans guests must co-operate with the employees, Mr. Leavitt said. Providing overnight accommodations is in the nature of an experiment, he emphasized.

The community building at the lake rim has been opened for winter visitors. Mr. Leavitt announced. A fire will be kept going in the building, he said, and may be used for getting warm by sportmen and other park visitors. The building has tables and benches and these may be used for eating lunch.

As was the case last year, regular meals and short orders may be procured by visitors during the winter at the park administration dining hall.

Ground cover of snow was 55 inches deep at park headquarters yesterday morning, 7 1/2 inches having fallen during the night, rangers reported by radio. The snow had turned to rain at the time of the morning broadcast and it was still raining when rangers broadcast again at 4 p. m.

Park roads were open but travel was treacherous and only expert drivers with proper equipment could get to headquarters safely, rangers said. The roads were slushy, the rain breaking up the layer of snow left by the plows, they stated. It was likely that skiing would not be good today, they asserted, and travel to the park was not encouraged.

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OKLAHOMA MAULS COUGARS TO WIN WITH GREAT EASE

NORMAN, Okla., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Oklahoma's Sooner's gridiron champions of the Big Six, crushed Washington State's Cougars, 28 to 0, here today with a last-half surge that carried them to the end of an all-victorious season and ran their victory string to 14 in a row.

A crowd estimated at 15,000 watched the Sooners explode for three touchdowns in the third period after drilling deep into enemy territory time after time without success in a scoreless first half.

The third stringers rambled to a fourth touchdown in the closing minutes and were knocking at the goal line again when the game ended.

By handing the first Pacific Coast team ever to perform in Oklahoma its worst beating of the season, the Sooners wrote the final figures into a season's record of 10 wins to carry undefeated Tennessee in the Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla., Jan. 2.

Hugh McCullough scored two touchdowns and Bob Seymour, hard-running halfback, the other in the third period spurge.

The wind helped the Sooners on their first scoring thrust. McCullough punted over the goal line and a penalty left the Cougars on their own three yard line.

Three plays later, McCullough plowed over from the one-yard line and Raphael Boudreau rushed in and kicked the extra point.

The following kickoff and an exchange of punts, the Sooners drove straight to another touchdown.

The third touchdown came at the end of a 33-yard drive, featuring a 12-yard pass from McCullough to Earl Crowder and a 19-yard dash by Seymour. McCullough rammed over from the four-yard line.

By the time the final period rolled around, the State lads were so badly battered that ever Sooner third and fourth stringers rolled over them with almost as much ease as the first and second stringers.

MISSISSIPPI NO COMPETITION FOR TENNESSEE SQUAD

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Dec. 3.—(AP)—The power valve on the University of Tennessee gridiron machine remained wide-open today and the Orange bowl selection roared to a 47 to 0 triumph over a hapless Mississippi Rebel team before 20,000 fans.

It was the Volunteers' tenth consecutive victory of the season. Six different ball carriers accounted for the touchdowns and the experts were chattering by half-time that "anybody" could score behind the blocking afforded by the Orange-clad forwards.

The Rebels, weakened by the absence of their injury-ridden all-America halfback, Parker Hall, much of the game, were completely bewildered by the potent offensive tactics of the victors.

Cafego, hailed as the Vols' No. 1 back, scored only one touchdown, climaxing a 64-yard drive, but spectacularly contributed to the other touchdowns. He turned in a major share of the 340 yards amassed by the Vols in their running game. Volunteer defenses held Mississippi's ground gaining to 56 yards.

The Vols opened their first offensive with Cafego flipping two long ones for sizeable gains and then going over himself from the one. His kick from placement was good, and it was Tennessee all the way thereafter.

In the third, Coffman contributed a 52-yard touchdown run down the sideline and on the first play after Mississippi received the kickoff, Wyatt snugged a Rebel tackle and streaked 34 yards for another score. Then Bust Warren added insult to injury by rambling 85 yards from his 18 for a touchdown behind peerless blocking.

Flood control of the Mississippi was begun by French settlers more than 50 years before the American revolution.

WALLA WALLA, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Washington State cracked a tough nut in beating Whitman college, 43 to 41, in a season's basketball opener here tonight. Bill Chase sank a rebound, with three seconds to go, for the winning points.

The Cougars took a long early lead, yielded it near the end of the first half and took the rest period square at 19 all. They pulled ahead in the second half but the smaller Missianians began matching basket for basket until, with five minutes left, they held a 35-30 lead.

Mealie Miller, a Walla Walla boy, kept the Cougars in the game with three baskets and Chase won it out of a scramble under the basket.

The Cougars used 12 players. Whitman's starting five played through without substitution.

Sam Byrd, Philadelphia pro, in second place yesterday, put a 37-35-72 with his 67 for another 140.

Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., shot a 34-34-68 that dropped him also into the 140 slot along with veteran Ed Dudley of Augusta and a pair of "unknowns" John Bulla of Chicago and Charles Yarnick of Tuxedo Park, N. J.

Strung out behind these were three pros at 141 and eight pros and an amateur at 142, making 20 entries with par or better.

"I would say," Layden declared, once outside the dressing room, "our effort today, while as fine as any coach has a right to expect, was not up to some of our previous performances."

"It seemed to me our running attack was less potent than it was earlier in the season."

Defending decisions made by his quarterbacks, Layden asserted. "Every man on my team is right in any decision he makes."

On the opposite side, Coach Howard Jones spoke quietly in praise of his team.

"I believe," he said, "we can promise to do all right against Duke in the Rose bowl—but that is something else to worry about now."
