DAWSON SHOWING WHEEL BALANCER TO AUTO OWNERS

A new Bear Dy-nam-ic wheel balancer has been installed at Dawson's Specialized Service shop, located at 44 North Front street, according to an announcement made today by J. H. Dawson, owner of the shop.

"The installation of this new type wheel balancing machine fulfills a long felt need of car owners in this vicinity who want greater safety in driving and greater tire economy," Mr. Dawson said.

"The Bear Dy-nam-ic wheel balancing process has been used by wheel manufacturers with success for some time and we feel that this is one of the most accurate wheel balancing machines ever put on the market," he continued.

The entire wheel is removed from the car and placed on the machine where it is revolved at all speeds with a unique neon eye registering the exact point on the wheel that is unbalanced.

Weights are then attached to the wheel at these points and the wheel is again tested and adjusted until it is perfectly balanced, he related.

Southern Oregon motorists have been extended an invitation to avail themselves of the use of this new equipment. A public demonstration will be held by Dawson's all day Tuesday, December 6, at which time the public will be shown just how the remarkable new Dy-nam-ic wheel balancer operates.

KING'S KIN HURT AS HORSE FALLS

LONDON, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The Duke of Gloucester—brother of King George VI.—broke his collar bone today when his horse fell and rolled on him after clearing a jump. The duke was riding to the hounds at Leicestershire. Physicians said the break was a simple fracture.

It was the duke's first spill since 1934. The fall was attributed to his mount losing his footing in soft ground.

The duke will be confined to bed for several days and all his engagements have been canceled, including that of representing the royal family next Thursday at the funeral of Queen Maude of Norway, his aunt.

The duke's accident recalled the many falls taken by his eldest brother, the exiled Duke of Windsor, another ardent horseman. Windsor, when Prince of Wales, fell

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MINERS SAVED BY LEAP FROM HOTEL

ANGELS CAMP, Calif., Dec. 3.—(AP)—One man was burned to death when fire destroyed a business block of this historic mining town early today, and fifty miners saved their lives by jumping from the second story of the Calaveras hotel.

The body of Gene Berg, 31, of Modesto and San Francisco, was found in the ruins by Harry Bardin, operator of the hotel. Bardin suffered a severely burned hand in fighting the blaze.

Berg was assistant foreman of the Harvey Amusement company of San Francisco.

Bardin said he thought the fire started from an electric device in the kitchen. Chief of Police Mel Switz estimated the damage at between \$150,000 and \$200,000.

DOUGLAS FARMER HELD ASSAULTER

ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Alfred Roberts, 36, Brockway farmer, was arrested today upon a complaint signed by his neighbor, Vernon Hixon, 40, who, according to Deputy Sheriff Clifford Thornton, claimed he suffered a broken jawbone and head cuts as a result of being struck over the head with a rifle wielded as a club. Thornton said the two men agreed in most details of the fight which reportedly developed from an argument over an open gate between the two properties. However, each of the principals, the officer said, accuses the other of being the aggressor. Roberts claiming that Hixon struck at him with a club and that he used his rifle in self defense.

Roberts, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, was released from custody upon \$500 bail.

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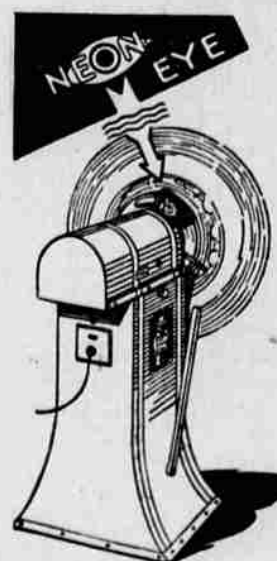
