

Dramatic History Of Air Achievements Subject Of Craterian Picture

FRED MAC MURRAY, LOUISE CAMPBELL IN AVIATION FILM

The dramatic story of the men and women pioneers of the air—a generation which includes such great names as Wilbur and Orville Wright, Glenn Curtiss, Bleriot, Lindbergh, Amelia Earhart, Wiley Post and Howard Hughes—is told in the new aviation epic in technicolor, "Men With Wings," which opens a four-day run today at the Craterian theatre.

Through the experiences of its three leading characters played by Fred MacMurray, Ray Milland and Louise Campbell, "Men With Wings" traces the history of aviation from its first flight at the dawn of the twentieth century down to its present day triumphs.

As the dramatic story of "Men With Wings" unfolds, the three friends are carried forward in the torrential surge of aviation's progress. The outcome of flying's struggle for life, the opening of the century means success or failure to them. The world war, when the machine they have built threatens to destroy civilization itself, means life and death. Swept along by a force they cannot even explain, they rush on through the boom days of the twenties, with Miss Campbell vainly trying to choose between the two types of birdmen—the courageous plane-builder Milland and the devil-may-care flier MacMurray. The turbulent thirties bring new heartaches and new triumphs to the trio, but they never lose the pioneer's passionate devotion to the progress of aviation.

The first airplane picture ever to be filmed in technicolor, "Men With Wings" was produced and directed by Hollywood's outstanding expert in the fields of both color and aviation, William A. Wellman. He filmed the never-to-be forgotten "Wings" of a decade ago, as well as the recent technicolor hits, "A Star Is Born" and "Nothing Sacred."

NAZI ABUSE OF JEWS TIGHTENED BY NEW DECREES

BERLIN, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Berlin officially restricted Jews today with an approach to Chamberlain's drive against the current anti-semitic drive started, had pledged there would be no ghetto for German Jews but newspaper headlines observed: "No ghetto but sharper division."

A decree by the chief of all German police, Heinrich Himmler, withdrew drivers' licenses and automobile and motorcycle permits immediately from all German Jews.

His order asserted the assassination of Ernst von Rath, secretary in the German embassy in Paris, by the young Polish Jew Herschel Grynszpan, showed Jews were "undependable and unsuited to keeping or driving motorized vehicles."

DNB, official news agency, commented "this preventive measure against Jewish arrogance gives an expression of the healthy sense of justice of the German people."

After Monday, Jews except those of foreign nationality cannot enter government buildings in the Wilhelmstrasse without special permit, nor visit such places at the memorial to the unknown soldier, museums, opera, athletic grounds.

STRIKERS' REJECT PEACE PROPOSAL

PORTLAND, Dec. 3.—(AP)—The memberships of Furniture Workers Unions Locals 1090 and 1482 rejected the latest proposal by two strike-bound furniture plants here, union officers said today.

Fred Marzuch, business agent of Local 1090, said the proposal still contained wage reductions and other provisions to which his union voiced "unanimous" objection.

The two plants, Doernbecher and B. F. John, have been idle seven weeks.

RUMANIA ROUGH IN CAMPAIGN TO END IRON GUARDS

BUCHAREST, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Three confessed terrorist prisoners were shot and killed today by their guards in Rumania's quick-triggered campaign to wipe out the Fascist-patterned, anti-Semitic Iron Guard.

The shooting of three assassins at Cluj brought to 17 the number of prisoners disposed of in that fashion within four days—all killed, officials said, when they attempted to escape. Last Wednesday Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, convicted of treason as leader of the Iron Guard, and 13 sub-leaders were shot down when, it was said, they tried to flee while being transferred from Rumnik-Sarat prison to Bucharest for questioning.

Codreanu was suspected by authorities of having directed an Iron Guard rebellion conspiracy from prison—a plot which they said cropped out at Cluj last Monday in an attempt on the life of the rector of the University of Cluj, an outspoken opponent of the Iron Guard.

The three killed today had confessed the assassination attempt on the rector, Flori Stefanescu Goanga. The rector was wounded gravely and

MT. RAINIER INN HAS MANY WOES

TACOMA, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Financial difficulties threaten to close one of the Pacific northwest's noted sports inns, Paradise Inn, Paul H. Sevon, general manager of the Rainier National Park company, said today.

"The chances are the park company will be all through by September, 1939," he said, unless it receives government or other financial aid. The park company operates Longmire Springs, Sunrise cabin camp and lodge in addition to the Paradise Valley lodge and inn.

Sevon said the company could not cope with "government-built resorts and those subsidized by railroads." The company has built up a deficit of \$218,250 above net receipts in the 22 years of its existence.

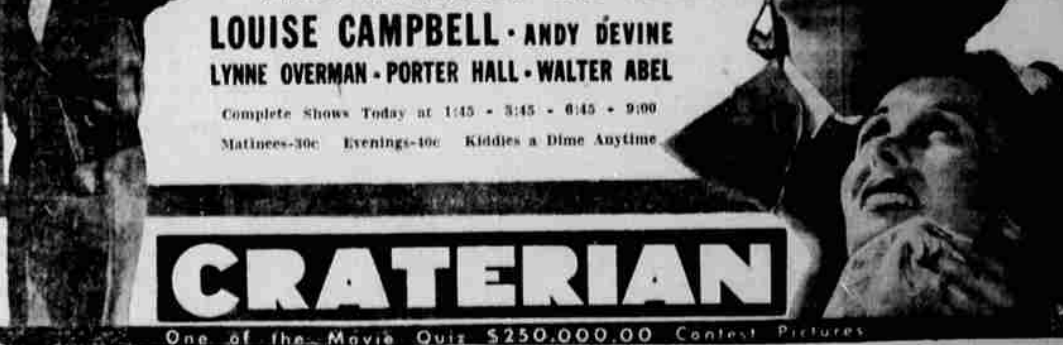
