BUSY ARMSTRONG STOPS MANFREDO IN THREE ROUNDS

Second Title Defense in Two Weeks Easy for Tireless Negro — Bout Headliner for All-Star Program

CLEVELAND, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Henry Armstrong, champion of the light-welterweight division, began today a holiday vacation from ring warfare after defending the title twice in two weeks.

Armstrong, who recently turned back Ceterino Garcia, made short work last night of Al Manfredo, of San Francisco, scoring a technical knockout over his fellow Californian in the third round of their scheduled 15-round bout.

Boxing's big names scored easy victories over Cleveland fighters in last night's supporting bouts.

The national boxing association's middleweight champion, Solly Krieger of Brooklyn, N. Y., 163½, punched out a 10-round verdict over Carmen Barth, 163½, in an over-weight match, the latter emerging from the fray with a broken nose.

Notre Dame Tops In Pigskin World Despite Trojans

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Dec. 6.—(AP)—Notre Dame, despite a 13-0 setback at the hands of Southern California, rated today as the nation's strongest team under the Dickinson system of calculating football power and brilliance.

The system, originated by Dr. Frank O. Dickinson, University of Illinois professor, ranked Tennessee, Duke, Texas Christian and Oklahoma—all undefeated and untied—below Notre Dame.

Dr. Dickinson's ratings were based on the strength of a team's opponents. He figured the opponents of Notre Dame in its five hardest games were stronger than those faced by the undefeated eleven.

COLLEGE GRID GATES IN SHARP INCREASE

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(AP)—Aided by a six-week stretch of near-perfect weather in the east, attendance at college football games for 1938 showed a sharp increase over 1937 figures.

An Associated Press survey based on figures submitted by 69 representative major colleges in all sections of the country disclosed an 11 per cent rise in average attendance per home game.

The total attendance for 351 games in 1938 was 8,146,124, compared to 7,386,111 for 353 games a year ago. This year's average was 23,208 or 2,284 better than the 1937 figure.

JONES BOYS WIN IN TWO MATCHES ON ARMORY CARD

The Jones boys of Arkansas—Mike, Tony and Tuffy—gave a capacity crowd at the Medford armory last night one of the most sensational wrestling programs of the year, and although they didn't make a clean sweep of their matches with Floyd Britt, Cecil McGill and Frankie Schroll they consider the evening a huge success in every respect.

They won two out of the three bouts, and in two short hours won their way into the heart of every grappling fan who saw them perform. They really have what it takes.

Twenty-two-year-old Mike, the baby of the family, was the only one to taste defeat. He fell before the vicious arm-breaking assault of dirty Floyd Britt in the opening event, but even in this case the Family of Jones didn't end exactly behind the eight ball.

Mike, lithe as a tiger and more active, lost to the Britt villain because he couldn't fathom the latter's devastating arm and neck-breakers over the ropes. Britt poured it on for two rounds, and then took falls in the third and fourth to end things. At least a dozen times before Earl Yonkey attempted to award the match to little Brother Mike on fouls, but he would have none of it.

Finally, in the third round, Tony maneuvered around like a Genoa truck and applied a leg cradle hold for the first fall. In the fourth round he duplicated the business for the second fall and the match. McGill staged a game fight, but he was helpless in the face of the barrel who was a man.

Terrific, back-breaking bear hugs enabled Tuffy, a short, stocky specimen of Arkansas hillbilly, to defeat Frankie Schroll in a spectacular main event. Frankie, somewhat bewildered by the unorthodox but clean tactics of his opponent, won the first fall with body slams and a press, but Tuffy came back to literally squeeze Schroll into a rag doll and win the next two tumbles.

The Scufflers are all clean grapplers, and have more tricks up their sleeves than any dozen wrestlers who ever appeared here. Because of the bitterness between Britt and Tony, Prommer Mack Lillard stated last night that Britt would either face Tony in the ring next week or he wouldn't face anybody.

SCALZO FLATTENS ARCHIBALD QUICK

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(AP)—The featherweight championship, which has been a wide open affair ever since Henry Armstrong gave it up, was more of a free-for-all than ever today, with Pety Scalzo, from New York's west side, in the forefront of the battling.

Pety tossed three smashing right hooks last night and flattened Roy Archibald, of Pawtucket, R. I., in two rounds. Archibald is recognized as champion by the New York state athletic commission, and the National Boxing association rates him among the top-flight, although ruler he would have to beat the winner of a Freddy Miller-Leo Rodak bout before gaining recognition.

Scalzo, however, tossed a considerable-sized monkey-wrench into the business with his kyo win. He weighed 127½ to Archibald's 124½.
