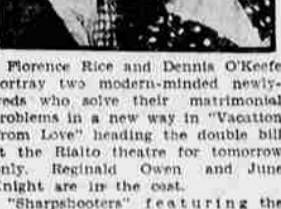

JACKSON COUNTY BUILDING & LOAN PAYS 4 PER CENT

A dividend at the rate of 4 per cent per annum on both savings and investment share accounts for the last six months' period was voted by the board of directors of the Jackson County Federal Savings and Loan association at a meeting last night.

In addition to declaration of dividends, which will distribute over \$12,700 to approximately 600 savings members, additional funds have been added to the surplus and reserve accounts. A. P. Butler, secretary of the association, said today.

The 22 federal savings and loan associations in Oregon now have aggregate assets of \$12,989,900, an increase of \$1,281,150 since January 1. In the first 10 months of 1938, these mutual, locally owned and operated, thrift and home-financing institutions, supervised by the Federal Home Loan Bank board, reported savings invested in them increased \$1,348,510, the total savings entrusted to their care as of November 1 being \$3,728,570.

Such savings are fully protected up to \$5000 for each investor by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance corporation, a \$116,000,000 federal government agency.

INDICT MEXICANS IN AIRPLANE PLOT

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Dec. 6.—(AP)—The federal government today indicted Gen. Roberto Plerro, former head of the Mexican army air corps, six other Mexicans, including a general and two colonels, two Americans and a Mexican aviation company for conspiring to violate the neutrality act of 1935.

The indictment named as a co-conspirator, but did not indict, Felix Gordon Ordaz, Spanish ambassador to Mexico.

Also listed as a co-conspirator was Jose Melendreras, military attaché to the Spanish embassy. The bill charged 19 airplanes were transported from the United States to Mexico for trans-shipment to loyalist Spain.
