WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—A Portland, Ore., police officer told the House un-American committee today that Harry Bridges and Harold Pritchett, West coast labor leaders, were attempting through their organizations to overthrow the United States government.

Capt. James Keegan, chief of Portland detectives, testified evidence in his files "supports this statement absolutely."

"Do you say their real purpose is to overthrow this government by force and violence?" Representative Francis (D-Ala.), a committee member, asked.

"Yes, sir," was the reply. "They are moving through their labor movements and anything else open to them. We have in our files ample information to prove these statements conclusively."

Bridges is West coast CIO maritime director and Keegan identified Pritchett as president of the Lumber and Saw Mill Workers' union.
