SIX NEGROES IN MASS EXECUTION AT GEORGIA PEN

Electrocutions Require Hour and 21 Minutes — One White Man Is Granted Last Minute Reprieve

REIDSVILLE, Ga., Dec. 9.—(AP)—Six negro murderers were put to death in the electric chair in the state prison today in the largest mass execution in Georgia's history. The electrocutions required an hour and 21 minutes. A seventh prisoner, a white man, Tom Dickerson, convicted of strangling the infant child of a daughter, was granted a last minute reprieve.

The six negroes who paid with their lives for slayings were: Jim Henry Williams, Charlie Barker and Raymond Carter, convicted of slaying Police Chief C. T. Thornton of Jackson, Ga.; Arthur Perry and Arthur Mack, sentenced for slaying Charles R. Helton, Columbus, Ga.; fairground watchman and Willie Russell, Cobb county negro, convicted of killing George W. Camp, farmer, and his daughter, Mrs. Christine Paula, near Smyrna, Ga., last October.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Dec. 9.—(AP)—Two more prison convicts died today in California's new glass and steel gas chamber for the murder of two men in an attempted prison escape.

Wesley Eudy, 34, and Fred Barnes, 40—the third and fourth of the five hardened criminals sentenced to the gas chamber—were pronounced dead at 10:15 today, eight minutes after entering the chamber.

Two others preceded them last week for the murder of Warden Clarence Larkin in the futile attempt to escape September 19, 1937, which cost four lives.

Barnes, smiling but obviously nervous, was led into the chamber first, and chatted with guards while being strapped to the chair. Nodding to reporters he said:

"Take it as cheerful as I am and you'll be all right."

Eudy, more grim, was led to the chair next to him and strapped quickly. Barnes said, "Goodbye Eudy." Then both called out, "Goodbye guards, goodbye guards."

The door was sealed at 10:02. Both of them began gasping for breath a minute and a half later. Soon their eyes were glazed and their heads swelled.

Four minutes after the door was sealed Barnes emitted a series of weird moans and drooled from the mouth. Both of their bodies jerked convulsively.
