LAST RITES FOR POISON SLAYER

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 9.—(UP)—The body of Mrs. Anna Marie Hahn, poison murderer electrocuted Wednesday night at the state prison for mercy and murdered the Lord's prayer, was buried Thursday.

Only her three attorneys, three matrons and Ohio penitentiary officials attended the last rites, rendered by Father John A. Sullivan, prison chaplain and Mrs. Hahn's confessor in her last moments of life.

Her grief-stricken 12-year old son, Oscar, who had begged Governor Martin L. Davey to spare his mother's life because she had been such a wonderful mother to me, had been taken to Cincinnati, scene of the four poison murders for which his mother died.

One large basket of flowers lay on her grave. The card said, "With deepest sympathy—from friends in Cincinnati." Her grave was in a charity section of Mt. Calvary Catholic cemetery.

MACHINE TO TEST DRIVER REACTION AT AUTO DISPLAY

A "repeat attraction" on the program of the Medford automobile show, tonight and Saturday night in the armory, will be the booth sponsored by the Commercial Finance corporation containing a display furnished by Secretary of State Earl Smith, featuring the reactometer, a machine which measures the time required for a motorist to react to a highway emergency.

Several improvements have been made upon the machine since it was last displayed here. The moving highway upon which the "motorist" must guide his car has been realigned, the model roadside scenery has been changed, indicators have been added to the dashboard showing whether the motor is on or off, and the mechanism has been given a thorough tuneup.

The person taking the reaction test sits at the steering wheel in a model driving compartment, complete with dashboard, clutch, and brake pedals and instruments. By pressing on the accelerator with his foot he sets in motion a canvas strip with a highway painted upon it, located in a recess directly in front of the steering wheel. The "driver" must steer so that the model car on the highway remains within the right-hand lane.

When a signal light flashes red, the "driver" applies the brake as quickly as possible, and the length of time intervening between flashing of the light and application of the brake is indicated upon a lighted board above the compartment.

The machine was used by more than 1000 persons during the show last year. The test is available, free of cost, to any person of driving age. A representative from the office of Secretary Smith will be in attendance at the booth.
