

PINE BEETLE IN UNION CRK. AREA NOW CONTROLLED

Control of the western pine beetle in a stand of ponderosa pine in the Union Creek ranger station area was announced yesterday by the Clatsop National Forest headquarters.

The job consisted of felling, peeling and burning the bark of 87 infested trees that had been barked by trained "spotters" who were sent here by the Portland regional office.

The technique of the treating work was demonstrated to the ERA crew by H. C. Ory, assistant supervisor who had four seasons of experience in insect control on the Clatsop National Forest in central Oregon before being transferred to the Rogue.

Statistics show that the board-foot loss of ponderosa pine from western pine beetle in Oregon and Washington for the five-year period 1932-1936 was about equal to the sawmill cut of the two states in the same period.

HEREFORD BULLS AVERAGE \$127 AT RECENT AUCTION

A report on sales at the recent auction and show sponsored at the fairgrounds here by the Clatsop Hereford Breeders' association, shows 29 Hereford bulls disposed of at an average price of \$127.50 and seven Hereford heifers at an average of \$115.

A registered Hereford bull, Mt. Crest Domino 4th, consigned by Mount Crest Ranch of Hill, owned by Reginald Parsons, brought \$300 top money in the auction. The animal was purchased by L. J. Horton, Tule Lake breeder, as breeding bull for his herd.

Those consigning stock to the sale included Mount Crest ranch, Bert Hoy of Weed, Cal.; the Charles Horton, Tule Lake, Cal.; the Charles Brothers ranch, Brownsboro, Ore.; and Florence Rock ranch, Prospect, Ore., owned by Nion Tucker.

In competitive showings, Marshall Garrett of Eagle Point won first prize for a pen of three steers, 1 to Bradshaw and Sons of Brownsboro, second, and Charley Brown of Brownsboro, third. The Garrett steers were acclaimed well worthy of their honor, being a group of well-finished, heavy animals.

The steers shown here were the top of three herds and evenly weighted, two of the groups weighed exactly the same, 2870 pounds. Another group weighed 2810 pounds an average of 950 pounds, the animals weighing as much as those which are topping the Portland and San Francisco markets.

According to A. E. Levin of Prospect, secretary-treasurer of the Clatsop Hereford Breeders' association, the sale this year was very successful with a large crowd and general satisfaction being voiced. In expressing his thanks to the buyers, Mr. Levin declared the association expects to have even a larger sale next year.

DEATH COMES TO MRS. BURTON, 87, WELL KNOWN HERE

Mrs. Alice Cotton Whitney Burton, 87, socially prominent early resident of Minneapolis, traveler and poet, died December 8 at Deephaven, where she had lived since 1899.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. E. M. Pomeroy, and son, Corby R. Pomeroy of Central Point, a son, Ward C. Burton, and six grandchildren, Gale C. Burton, Alice Whitney Burton, Lindsey J. Burton, John C. Burton, Hazel W. Burton and Elmer G. Burton, all of Deephaven.

Her father was descended from the Whitneys of Wales, who settled in Watertown, Mass. in 1635. Mrs. Burton's early days were spent at Southborough, Mass. She was an active member of the Salem Oratorical society. Later she became a teacher at Union and at Hopkinton, Mass.

Through her father's association with William Lloyd Garrison, Mrs. Burton became familiar with the events and the men of the abolitionist movement in Massachusetts during the Civil war. She was frequently a guest at the home of Ralph Waldo Emerson as her mother and Mrs. Emerson were first cousins.

MEDFORD DRIVERS AVERAGE 3.4 SEC. ON REACTOMETER

The average Medford driver requires exactly three-fourths seconds in which to react to a highway emergency, it was revealed by the reactometer furnished by Secretary of State Earl Seal in the booth sponsored by the Commercial Finance corporation at the Medford automobile show Friday night.

The test is designed to show how much time elapses between perception of danger on the highway and application of the brake. The machine, installed in the secretary of state's office, consists of a regular driving compartment, a moving track upon which a model automobile must be steered by the person being tested, and a red signal light which tells the driver to apply the brake. The time which elapses between the flashing of the signal and application of the brake is the person's reaction time.
