## OREGON FIVE OFF ON EASTERN TRIP

EUGENE, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Coach Howard Hobson last night picked a 12-man squad for the University of Oregon's 7000-mile basketball argony across the country.

First intending to take only 10 men, then 11, the Oregon cage skipper finally decided on 12, which put two more sophomores, Evert McNeely and Don Mabae on the squad.

Already named for the trip were nine veterans, Gale, Wintermute, Anst, Johansen, Hardy, Sarpola, Pavlunas, Mullen and Dick Sandness, a third soph, was picked Thursday.

The Webfoots, after playing Portland university Pilot at Portland last night, hopped a train for New York to play City College of New York in Madison Square Garden December 17.

## TOUCHDOWN PASS GETS UCLANS TIE IN GRID FINALE

O.S.C. Gets Three First Downs, Foe Collects 23—State Scores Early in Game.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 10.—The Pacific Coast conference grid war came to an end here today as the Bruins of University of California at Los Angeles and Oregon State's Beavers struggled to a 6 to 6 tie before a disappointed crowd of less than 10,000.

Spattered all over the coliseum under a 42 to 7 licking from Southern California last Thanksgiving day, the Uclans came back against the strong Beaver and rolled up 23 first downs to 3, and gained 388 yards to 114.

The final result, however, found the Bruins giving a remarkable demonstration of traveling nowhere, for the score remained dead-locked at the final gun.

Oregon State scored in the first two minutes of play. Hal Higgins, 170-pound Beaver halfback, took the Bruin opening kickoff and ran it back 84 yards before Hal Hieshon pulled him down on the six-yard stripe. Jim Kesselburgh butted the ball to the 3, and then Higgins carried it over. Hutchins failed to convert.

The Bruins recovered from the shock and twice before the half ended pounded down within Oregon State's one-yard stripe, and both times were tossed back by the Beaver forward wall.

THE UCLA touchdown finally arrived after Kenny Washington went into the game after the half time. The lanky Negro star and fullback Bus Sutherland ran and passed the ball deep into Beaver territory and son after the fourth period began, continued on to the 7, where Washington passed over the goal to Jim Mitchell, substitute end. The Bruin attempt for the extra point was wide and wobbly.

Yards and first downs continued to spin under the UCLA cleats but luck was against them. Late in the game a Beaver pass was intercepted within the Bruin 30-yard line. Cantor took it on a lateral from McPherson and started breaking up field. He bowled through several Beavers but he couldn't take out before Tom Fitzpatrick when he reached midfield. The two hit hard and Cantor went down. Booe of rage roared out of the Bruin rooting section as the rapless official trotted away.

UCLA fought on down to the Oregon State 10-yard line, and with 11 seconds to go, tried a field goal. It missed.

The game was the last conference contest for Coach William H. (Bill) Spaulding, who becomes athletic director next year.

## ST. MARY'S NOSES OUT BUTTE FALLS; PROSPECT ON TOP

Thriller of the first round of games was produced in Medford, when St. Mary's nosed out Butte Falls, 19 to 18, in a game which kept the large crowd on edge throughout. Jensen and Jimmy Lewis each tallied 6 points for the winners, while Hoef scored 8 for Butte Falls. Halftime count was 10 to 7, St. Mary's. In a preliminary, Butte Falls graders took a 17 to 6 win from St. Mary's graders.

In the other division 1 encounter, Prospect showed tremendous scoring punch in defeating Eagle Point at Prospect, 39 to 15. Tribbett hit 21 points and Weber connected for 14 for the winners. Substitute Danack tallied 8 for Eagle Point. In the preliminary, Prospect second stringers beat Eagle Point reserves, 33 to 10.

Division 2 games saw the Central Pointers, defending champions, beat Gold Hill, 41 to 15, at Central Point; Rogue River won from Phoenix, 27 to 24; and Kerby down Sama Valley, 39 to 19.

## WHITE SOX OFFER WOUNDED HURLER LIFE TIME BERTH

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Baseball offered a lifetime job today to Monty Stratton, the ace Chicago White Sox pitcher who recently underwent amputation of his right leg after suffering a gunshot wound.

J. Louis Comiskey, White Sox president, notified Stratton that as soon as he is fully recovered he can step into a permanent position with the White Sox office organization. At the same time, Comiskey said a benefit game for Stratton will be played April 17 between the White Sox and the Chicago Cubs, the city's National league entry.

On November 27, Stratton was targeted shooting on his mother's farm near Greenville, Texas, when his revolver accidentally discharged. The bullet struck below the hip, coursing down to the knee. He lost much blood before his wife, Ethel, got him to a Dallas hospital. The next day amputation was performed at the knee.

"Monty has a job with us as long as he wants it," said Comiskey. "He was a fine pitcher and is a finer man. Baseball can't afford to lose him."

Comiskey conferred briefly today with P. K. Wrigley, owner of the Cubs, and then announced plans for the Cub-Sox game, all proceeds from which will go to Mr. and Mrs. Stratton, whose son, Monty, Jr., was a year old the day the amputation operation was performed.

Harry Grabner, White Sox vice president, said Stratton was "coming along fine" and may leave the hospital in two weeks. He was a "big factor in White Sox hopes for 1939" having won 15 games the past season even though out of action with a sore arm for the first month of the campaign.

## JUNIOR HI QUINT DRILLS HARD FOR JOURNEY UPSTATE

Medford junior high school's basketball team, under the coaching of George Harrington, is rapidly rounding into form for one of the most interesting schedules ever faced by a junior high quintet here. ## ROSE BOWL SOLD OUT FOR TROJAN TILT WITH DUKE

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 10.—(AP)—The Rose Bowl, as might be expected, has been sold out for the Duke-Southern California grid battle January 2.

Officials of Southern California, the host school, formally announced today that no more ticket applications need be sent in, and gave strong intimation that many thousand requests now on hand would have to be returned, unopened.

"It is a shame," sighed Director of Athletics Willis O. Hunter, "that we can't get any more than about 90,000 people in the Pasadena bowl. We would like to take care of everyone who wants to go to the big game, but it seems that when something is full, it is full."

The rose bordered bowl officially seats 85,411, but last year additional seats were built over the tunnels and bleachers erected at both ends, and California and Alabama played before an official paid attendance of 87,287. Counting complimentary guests and a few hundred who scaled the barb-wire fences, the total throng was estimated at 90,000.

Gate receipts for the game totaled \$293,72, of the coming Southern California game will bring in as much or more.

News on the football activities of the two rivals remained scant during the past week. Duke's undefeated, untied and unscored on Blue Devils put in several days of practice at Durham, N. C., while the Trojans took the week off for rest after upsetting Notre Dame Saturday, 13 to 0. Coach Howard Jones will bring them back to the practice field Monday.

Close to 60,000 fans will bank themselves in the Polo Grounds tomorrow to watch the New York Giants and the Green Bay Packers fight for the championship of the National Professional Football league.

It is the league's real "super bowl" game, with the players of the contending team splitting 60 percent of the gate receipts and the respective owners also doing very well for themselves, thank you.

Each member of the winning side will realize something like \$600 to help him through the winter, while the losing gladiators will pocket about \$400 apiece. This is in addition to their fairly fat salaries they have received in the past several months.

The scramble for seats has been so enthusiastic that even the federal agents are trying to find out what happened to all the seats between the 10-yard lines. Tim Mara, owner of the Giants, is trying hard to explain to their satisfaction.

LAZZERI IS SIGNED TO PLAY SECOND ON DODGER TEAM

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Tony Lazzeri, who obtained his release from the Cubs a few days ago, announced today he had accepted terms to play second base for the Brooklyn Dodgers next year.

Lazzeri telegraphed Larry McPhail his acceptance of a one year contract after a long distance telephone negotiation with the Brooklyn official yesterday.

He declined to reveal salary terms but expressed satisfaction with the deal. He said he was most happy over the fact he will get back into player's harness.

Star of many world's series while playing for the Yankees 12 years, the husky San Francisco born Italian drew his release and signed this year with the Chicago Cubs as utility player and coach.

Lazzeri, despite his long service in the majors, said he thought he was "good for many years as a player." He lives in Millbrae near here and spends most of his time on the golf links.

He emphasized he was joining Brooklyn with the agreement he was to play second base regularly.

CANZONERI WINS ANOTHER BATTLE

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—(AP)—Tony Canzoneri, hero of a famous boxing comeback several years ago when he won the lightweight title a second time after losing it to Barney Ross, moved along the comeback trail again tonight by outpointing Jimmy Murray, young Brooklyn welterweight, in an eight-round bout at Ridgewood Grove tonight. Canzoneri weighed 143½ to Murray's 141.

A capacity crowd of about 4,500 saw the former champion start slowly, then earn a decisive victory by his harder punching and more expert boxing. He had Murray a little rocky in the sixth when he landed a haymaker on Jimmy's jaw and had no trouble at all taking the decision.

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
