CARE IN CUTTING YULE TREES URGED

United States forest service today issued a plea for public co-operation in preserving scenic assets by not cutting family Christmas trees along highways or roads.

"People in the community can do much toward helping to preserve the roadside beauty and scenic strips along the highways by not cutting their Christmas trees within a minimum distance of 300 feet from each side of the road or highway," said a statement issued by Rogue River national forest headquarters.
