We have voluntarily abandoned for a period of many years." He gave this picture of modern warfare.

"War today differs fundamentally from all wars of the past inasmuch as today its first and most numerous victims are not professional fighters but the civilian population, the workman and the clerk, the housewife and the mother of all the children."

War Technique Told — The results he claimed for his policy were these time records: In the past year: The British-Irish, British-Italian, British-German, British-American and French-German agreements.

The prime minister disclaimed any personal preference for nazism or fascism.

"The complete subordination of individual independence to something which is called the state, but which really only means those who for the time being rule the state," he said, "would be insupportable because it runs counter to all our most fundamental conceptions of the framework of human society."
