45,514 DECREASE REPORTED BY WPA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—(AP)—The works progress administration reported today a 45,514 decrease in work relief enrollment during the week ended December 10. This, described by officials as one of the sharpest drops in recent WPA history, brought total rolls down to 3,139,045, a decrease of 123,624 from the all-time peak of 3,262,669 on November 5.

All except 16 states shared in the downward trend. The largest declines were reported by Pennsylvania (71,767), Washington State, (58,001) and New Jersey (37,411).

Roosevelt Selling Christmas Trees

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—(AP)—About 1,000 American homes will be decorated for the holiday season with Christmas trees grown on President Roosevelt's estate in Dutchess county, N. Y.

The president said yesterday he thought his Christmas tree business was getting along all right and that he was selling about 1,000 trees this year.

He said whether he was receiving a good price, he said it was about the same as last year.
