

INVADER OF HOSPITAL WOUNDS GUARD, SLAYS PATIENT FOR REVENGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 15.—(AP)—A young man invaded ward F of the San Francisco hospital today, shot and killed a patient and critically wounded a policeman.

Inspector Jerome Smith said the youth gave his name as George Daily, 21. He was captured in a corridor. The officer said revenge evidently was the motive.

The victim was Morris Cornpropat, 24, who was being guarded as the result of a spectacular knife and gun fight on November 30, when he was wounded.

Policeman Walter Salsbury, 46, who was guarding Cornpropat, hurried to the door with drawn gun when he heard a commotion and was shot and critically wounded.

Hospital orderly John Busovich heard the shots and over-powered Daily in the hall.

Inspector Smith said Daily's sister, Sue, shot Cornpropat when he attempted to flee during the previous fight in her home.

He said the girl waited in an automobile outside the hospital while her brother went to Cornpropat's room today. She was taken into custody and held to answer for the death.

"I'm glad to hear that," he said. "It saves me the trouble."

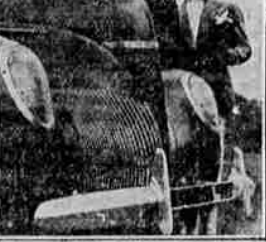
JOSEPHINE CO. CUPID IDELE FOR TWO WEEKS
