

Medford 1892 Candidates Are Shown in Old Ballot

A printed state of Republican candidates for Oregon state and Jackson county offices in 1892 and an official town of Medford ballot for the election of January 12, 1892, were received by The Mail Tribune today from Mrs. Nellie Williams of Marysville, Cal.

The old documents belonged to Mrs. Williams' mother, Mrs. L. M. Culp, who was born and reared in the Rogue river valley and was a descendant of the Griffin and Miller families.

The Republican ticket in 1890 was: For congress, Binger Hermann; supreme judge, R. S. Bean; governor, D. P. Thompson; secretary of state, George W. McBride; state treasurer, Phil Metschan; superintendent of public instruction, E. B. McElroy; state printer, F. C. Baker; prosecu-

tor in first judicial district, C. B. Watson.

Jackson county: For state senator, Theo. Cameron; representatives, J. M. McCall, J. W. Merritt and George Brown; clerk, Max Muller; recorder, M. L. Alford; sheriff, J. O. Birdsey; treasurer, James Cronmiller; school superintendent, C. B. Fitzgerald; assessor, I. L. Hamilton; commissioner, William Ray; surveyor, Peter Applegate; coroner, Dr. J. S. Parson.

Medford precinct: For justice of the peace, C. W. Skeel; constable, J. W. Short.

The official ballot for the Town of Medford listed candidates for only the Democratic and Citizen parties, there being no Republican designations. Some of the candidates had both Democratic and Citizen endorsement.

The 1892 candidates were: For mayor, George B. Walton and J. A. Whiteside; trustees, D. H. Miller, E. J. Montague, E. B. Pickel, W. B. Roberts, J. W. Short and William P. Wood.

For recorder, J. H. Paris and N. A. Jacobs; for treasurer, G. H. Hoskins; for marshal, L. C. Rodenberger and A. Z. Beare.

Lincoln-Zephyr To Be Shown Saturday by Gates Auto Firm

A new V-12 Lincoln-Zephyr for 1939, with refined styling, increased passenger comfort and important mechanical improvements including new hydraulic brakes, will be shown Saturday by C. E. Gates Auto company.

The new Lincoln-Zephyr is available in six body types, eight modern colors and a variety of upholstery options. Body types include a sedan with four doors, a coupe-sedan with two doors, a three-passenger coupe, a town-limousine, a convertible sedan and a convertible coupe.

The modern vogue of streamline design is advanced still further in the 1939 car. This design was introduced to the motoring world when the Lincoln-Zephyr was first announced late in 1935. Since that time it has exerted an increasingly dominant influence on motor car styling generally.

The trim front end, the sweep of the lengthened hood as it blends into the low, roomy body and the flowing rear deck line unite to create an air of fleetness and grace.

This is accentuated by the almost vertical front profile, the vertical lines of the radiator grille and the streamlined bars of the front bumper. Chromium-plated decorative strips relieve the severe beauty of the unbroken hoodside panel. A bright moulding sweeps back to the rear of the body.

The side view of the car has a pleasing, unbroken smoothness created by the introduction of a new treatment in door design. The doors now carry extensions at their lower edges which conceal the narrow running boards and also serve to keep them clean. The design does away with exposed running boards but retains the added floor strength and body rigidity which they provide.

The passenger compartment floor is level with the running boards. This enables passengers to step easily and

directly into the car. The graceful lines of the fenders blend smoothly into the body panels. Shields enclose the rear fender openings.

Unusually smart styling and careful selection of appointments and equipment add to the charm of the interiors and contribute to the comfort of driver and passengers. The big, narrow-stem steering wheel and high-ratio steering gear allow the car to be handled easily, especially in parking.

The gear shift lever is removed from the floor and operates under the instrument panel.

G. PASS ROTARIANS WIN GOLF MATCH

SALT LAKE PRO TIES M'SPADEN FOR LEAD

GRANTS PASS, Dec. 16.—(Sp.)—Rotarian golfers of Grants Pass broke a tie with Medford Rotarians Wednesday, when after the local Rotary luncheon they played a return tournament and won, 13½ points to 10½ points for the Medford players.

At Medford the preceding week the local Rotarians had managed to tie the score on the Rogue Valley golf course, 12 points for each team. The win here gave the Grants Pass club this year's victory and possession of an inter-city cup the clubs have agreed to contest for.

At the Wednesday Rotary meeting preceding the tournament, the speaker, W. A. He blamed distribution practices under which he said advertising hurt farmers and growers, and declared the cure would be to correct distribution itself.
