PHILLIPS PLEADS SELF-DEFENSE IN LA GRANDE DEATH

LA GRANDE, Dec. 17—(AP)—Self-defense was the plea offered today by Jesse Phillips as he sought freedom from a charge of murdering Frank Bryant and wounding Mrs. Elsie Carlson, lone Phillips' common-law wife, in a shooting here last October 19.
In clear, even tones marked by not the slightest hesitation, Phillips gave his version of the shooting.
He first told of knowing Mrs. Carlson since he was 13 years old and living with her for the past 10 years. Her habits were a source of worry to him, he claimed, and he said he tried to protect her from them.
On October 19, while driving into La Grande, he said he was behind an automobile, the occupants of which he could not identify at the moment. Someone fired a shot, narrowly missing his dog and he stopped. Approaching the city limits, he said he recognized Mrs. Carlson's daughter, Betty, 15, and followed the car because he had some mail for her.
The car stopped before a residence and Phillips got out of his machine and approached. As he did so, Bryant leveled a pistol at him and Mrs. Carlson shortly afterward came out of the house with a gun. Phillips said he called out and told them to put the guns away and the shooting started.
One shot blinded him, he said, and he fired back. On his third shot he saw Bryant slump over the wheel but in the meantime he said he had been wounded in the side so he walked from the scene to police headquarters.
The jury examined both automobiles and found on Phillips' machine two apparent bullet marks.

CANADIAN FLAYS DIES COMMITTEE

ABERDEEN, Wn., Dec. 17—(AP)—Harold Pritchett, Vancouver, B. C., president of the International Woodworkers of America, today denounced the Dies congressional committee which recently investigated un-American activities by describing it as "neither fish nor flesh but mostly foul." He was here for a meeting of the Grays Harbor branch of the I.W.A.
Referring to a Portland officer's testimony before the Dies committee assailing him, Pritchett asserted the testimony was "based on statements without evidence" to attack "me personally and through me to attack the union."
"In my opinion," he said, "the Dies committee is neither fish nor flesh but mostly foul and is the spearhead of reaction based on unreliable testimony. They produced no facts—only prejudice."
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SEATTLE SHOPPERS IGNORE PICKETS

SEATTLE, Dec. 17—(AP)—Christmas shopping at the large Frederick & Nelson Department store proceeded at an apparent good volume today, despite picket lines outside. Most of the employees, with the exception of teamster's porters, and a few office and other workers, were on duty.
Superior Judge Hugh C. Todd banned a strike of employees until after a further hearing January 9 and ordered the pickets withdrawn at an emergency session yesterday. The dispute is between union and non-union employees.
Deliveries were halted when teamsters refused to drive trucks.
Henry Clay Agnew, attorney for the employees who obtained the restraining order, said steps were to be taken today to serve the pickets and labor leaders involved in the court order, to end the picketing.

PRESIDENT TOLD OLSEN AID PLAN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17—(AP)—Culbert L. Olson, California's governor-elect, told President Roosevelt today the federal government should take over the burden of old age pensions and payments should start at 60 instead of 65 years.
He asked the president, during a White House conference, to support such a proposal in the new congress as an amendment to the social security act.
The meeting was the first since the enter executive and Olson since the latter became the first Democrat to be elected governor of California in more than 40 years. The president supported Olson in his campaign.

PREDICTS SENATE TO REJECT SMITH

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17—(AP)—Senator Bridges (R., N.H.) predicted today the senate would reject nomination of Donald Wakefield Smith for another term on the national labor board.
"His record is one of extreme partisanship and bias," Bridges declared, "and he is absolutely unsuited for the job."

SLIGHT DROP IN COST OF LIVING

NEW YORK, Dec. 17—(AP)—Living cost of wage earners declined 2-10 of 1 percent from October to November, the National Industrial Conference Board, a private research organization supported chiefly by large corporations, said today. Food prices declined 4 percent, more than any other group. Coal prices increased 6 percent during the same period.

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
