

Giant Oregon Five Upset 38-36 By City College, Before 16,000

WEBFEET UNABLE TO SCORE FIRST 15 MINUTES PLAY

Anet High Scorer — Tight Defense of Victors Puzzle — Last Half Rally Short.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Overcoming their difference in height with a great exhibition of guarding, City College's diminutive basketball team staved off a last half rally to defeat the favored University of Oregon five tonight, 38 to 36.

More than 16,000 fans crowded Madison Square Garden for the city's first doubleheader of the season. Northwestern met St. John's in the other game.

Completely bottling up the Oregon attack in the first half with a style of defense that refused to let the westerners get set, the New Yorkers built up a half-time margin of 19 to 14. The Webfoots never scored a field goal in the first 15 minutes, but kept in the running with eight shots out of ten free throws.

After getting three field goals near the end of the first half Oregon came back strong in the second period and tied the count at 30 all with nine minutes to play. Yet the Beavers refused to be downed and Al Soupios and Babe Adler provided a small lead to which they clung tenaciously.

Bob Anet of the victors was high scorer with seven foul shots and three field goals for a total of 13 points, one more than Dave Siperstein of City College, who was forced out of the game 14 minutes before the finish because of personal fouls.

SPECIFY WINNER AT TANFORAN IN THRILLING FINISH

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Specify, 3-year-old gelding owned by A. A. Baroni of Reno, Nev., won the \$10,000 added San Francisco handicap today at Tanforan track. It was a photographic finish. The time for the mile and one-sixteenth was 1:43 1-5. Ligaroti, Argentine thoroughbred, ran second and C. S. Howard's Advocate was third.

The winner, second choice in the betting, paid \$5.40, \$2.80 and \$2.60. Ligaroti, running with Olimpo and Comet 2nd as an entry of Bing Crosby of Hollywood and Lin Howard, San Francisco, paid \$2.60 and \$2.20. Advocate returned \$3.40.

The entry closed as the favorite. Specify, which ran close seconds to Lawrin, Kentucky derby winner, and the all-age champion horse, Seabiscuit, in races last summer, acted badly at the post.

After delaying the start and knocking down an assistant starter, the chocolate flash was taken to the outside. Charley Corbett, veteran rider from Petaluma, Calif., broke fast with Specify.

He urged his mount into the lead quickly, then swung into the rail. As the field swept past the first turn, Specify set the pace under slight restraint, with Comet 2nd and Mr. Blaze following and Ligaroti in fifth place.

Ligaroti moved up slowly to take second position as they galloped into the home stretch. At the sixteenth pole it was strictly a two-horse race, with Specify and the Argentine running head and head.

Ligaroti forged into a slight lead as the two thoroughbreds battled down the home stretch to the cheers of some 20,000 fans. In the last 20 yards, however, Specify went back into the lead to cross the finish line less than a nose the best of it.

FREAK HONORS TO GETCHELL RULING IN IRISH BATTLE

Vander Meer Two No-Hit Games in Row Voted Second in Year's Sports

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—(AP)—It is late in the afternoon of Saturday, October 22, Carnegie Tech's football team is playing Notre Dame and, in the fourth period, the score is 0-0. It is Carnegie's ball, near mid-field, and as the Skibos move into their huddle Quarterback Paul Friedlander turns to Referee John Getchell, asking: "What down is it?"

"Third down," says Getchell. Friedlander calls for a running play; it falls short of first down and, as the players come out of the pile-up and Carnegie prepares to line up for a fourth-down punt, Getchell awards the ball to Notre Dame on downs on Carnegie's 46-yard line, the Irish score the game's only touchdown three plays later, and the Tartans absorb their lone defeat of the year.

That quick mental reverse by Getchell from third to fourth down was tabbed the season's principal sports oddity by 38 of the 70 contributing sports editors in the eighth annual Associated Press poll. While few of the critics attempted to rate the "freak incidents" in the usual 1-2-3 order, and a ranking therefore was impossible, there was a far greater vote for Getchell's momentary lapse than for any other incident.

Second place among the 1938 oddities went to the two successive no-hit, no-run games pitched by Johnny Vander Meer of the Cincinnati Reds.

Not far back were the 2-2 football tie between Virginia Tech and Virginia Military, the collision of Stan Hack and Billy Jurges of the Cubs while chasing an easy infield roller (it cost the Cubs two runs in the second world series game), J. Smith Ferbee's awesome series of golf marathons, and Monty Stratton's hunting accident that ended so disastrously with the amputation of the Chicago White Sox pitcher's leg.

Out of a mass of contributions that included the nomination of "almost any ruling by the New York State Athletic commission," there were other such freakish happenings as:

Southern California, trailing Washington by 7-6 (the final score) late in their game, electing to kick rather than try for first down when it was fourth down and only a foot to go.

Detroit beating Santa Clara by the extra point, 7-6, the oddity arising from the fact that Detroit Coach Gus Dorais had suggested before the game that it be played without the try for point.

Ray Ainsley's feat of using up 19 strokes on one hole in the U. S. open golf championship at Cherry Hills.
Gabby Hartnett, usually as swift and elusive as a 10-ton truck, stealing home for the winning run against the Phillies.

In Jackson county class B high school conference basketball games Friday night, St. Mary's of Medford took over the undisputed division 1 leadership by noting out Prospect, 29 to 28, in a thriller at Medford, and Central Point and Kerby remained in a deadlock for the division 2 top spot by beating Rogue River and Gold Hill, respectively. The Pointers took a tough 17 to 14 win from Rogue River at Rogue River, and Kerby smashed Gold Hill, 34 to 11, at Kerby.

Other results saw Talent win from Eagle Point, 35 to 14, at Talent and Butte Falls dump Jacksonville, 44 to 29, at Butte Falls in division 1 tilt.

The St. Mary's victory was its second in a row by a one-point margin. Although Prospect was never ahead, the game was furiously fast and hard-fought, with the Prospectors scoring 13 points in a desperate last-quarter rally cut short by the gun.

St. Mary's led at the end of the first quarter, 11 to 5, at the half, 15 to 14, and at the end of the third period, 25 to 15.

John Jensen, St. Mary's forward, tallied 13 points to lead the Crusaders, while Tribbett scored 11 for Prospect.

Reese O'Neil hit 14 points in the second half and dumped a last-second field goal to give St. Mary's second team a 22 to 21 win over Prospect seconds and St. Mary's made it a clean sweep when the Crusader graders beat Prospect graders, 30 to 7. Both these games were preliminaries to the main event.

In the other division 1 games, Skeeters and Lockwood each scored 10 points in their teams' win over Eagle Point, and Hoef tallied 16 markers to pace Butte Falls in its Jacksonville conquest.

Central Point, in winning the division 2 encounter from Rogue River, was led by Beebe, who collected 10 points. Sexton scored 5 for the losers. The game was surprisingly close throughout.

Hill, guard, rung up 10 points for Kerby as the Josephine county team swamped Gold Hill. Score at the half was 19 to 6, Kerby.

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M'SPADEN KEEPS MIAMI OPEN LEAD AFTER BAD START

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Despite a bad start, Harold "Jug" McSpaden of Winchester, Mass., came through with a 71 today to retain his lead at the 54-hole mark in the \$10,000 Miami open golf tournament.

McSpaden's 71 added to his previous 66 and 69 gave him a total of 206 and a two-stroke lead.

Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., caught McSpaden at one point today but slipped back to a second-place tie with Johnny Revolta of Chicago despite a two-under-par 68. Revolta came up with a 67 in a day of wholesale par-shattering.

Ben Hogan of New York ripped off a 66 to move into a strong contending position at 210 where he was even with Johnny Bulls of Chicago. Bulls shot a 69, his second successive sub-par score.

Denny Shute, former P.G.A. champion of Coral Gables, carded 68 to join Ralph Guidahl, national open champion, at 212. Guidahl, recovering from a severe cold, equalled par 70.

Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., the pre-tournament favorite, also scored a 70 for a total of 213.

Frank Walsh of Bretton Woods, N. H., duplicated Hogan's 66, the day's lowest score, and came from the background to the 214 spot. He shared that position with Jimmy Thomson of Shawnee, Pa., who slipped to a 75, Paul Runyan of New York, who shot a 68, John Geertsen of Salt Lake City, Jimmy Hines of New York and Gray Wood of New York. Geertsen, whose 76 yesterday sent him down the list after an opening 66, came back with a 72, while Wood and Hines carded 73.

Bob Servis of Dayton, Ohio, continued to set the amateur pace, adding a 77 to his previous 149 for a total of 226.

The field will play the final 18 holes tomorrow, with \$2,500 going to the winning professional, \$1,250 to the runner-up and \$1,000 to the third place finisher.
