

# "The Citadel", Starring Robert Donat, Is Craterian's Dramatic Feature

## ROSALIND RUSSELL STARS IN ROMANCE OF YOUNG DOCTOR

"The Citadel," A. J. Cronin's famous best-selling novel of a young doctor who battles his ideals for worldly riches, opens a three-day showing today at the Craterian Theater.

Robert Donat and Rosalind Russell are starred in the principal roles with a distinguished cast appearing in supporting roles.

A dramatic love story is unfolded in the account of the young surgeon who struggles among the miners and marries a humble school-mistress. There is agonizing suspense when he descends into a mine that has collapsed to amputate the arm of a man trapped beneath a fallen timber. There is drama when he deliberately dynamites a sewer that has been spreading disease, but which the authorities refuse to remove.

Cronin's moving story has been made into a powerful motion picture that has won much praise from the critics. Robert Donat makes his first appearance on the American screen since his memorable portrayal of "The Count of Monte Cristo," and is said to give a fine characterization as the young doctor who forgoes his youthful ideals to win luxury and fame in social circles.

Much care was taken in the filming of the story to stay as closely as possible to the original. The result, advance reports say, is one of the finest motion pictures of the season.

## PERSHING RESTS IN ARIZONA; MAY PEN LIFE'S STORY

TUCSON, Ariz., Dec. 17.—(AP)—The man who kept the peace in the Philippines, put the fear of Uncle Sam's army into the banditry of Mexico and led the doughboys against the Hindenburg line settled down today at 78 to enjoy a winter of Arizona sunshine and to consider branching out into an entirely new line.

Gen. John J. Pershing is resting in a cottage on the edge of the desert, where he may finish his autobiography and prepare the stirring events of a long life for presentation as a motion picture.

A Hollywood producer has been negotiating for the moving picture rights and General Pershing has seriously considered the proposal, and is said to have indicated a preference for Gary Cooper in the principal role. Last winter's illness postponed the negotiations, but the general resumed work on the autobiography while in France this summer and hopes to complete it this winter.

But first must come a little resting and a physical check-up. Since Pershing left Tucson last April, after mastering a critical heart illness, he has travelled to France and back. He is expected to return to the desert sanatorium shortly after Christmas for an examination by his physician, Dr. Roland Davison.

## ACCUSED RUSSIAN SPY BAIL ASKED

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Russian government will endeavor to secure the release on bail of Mikhail Gorin, accused of espionage, but not of Hatis Salich, naturalized American arrested with Gorin, Soviet Vice-consul Mikhail Ivanushkin of New York declared today.

Ivanushkin conferred with both prisoners for more than an hour yesterday in the offices of United States Attorney Ben Harrison.

Gorin is Pacific coast manager for a Russian travel agency and Salich a former Berkeley, Calif., policeman who was employed recently by the naval intelligence service.

## SELECTED STOCKS ON WALL ST. SHOW RECOVERY SIGNS

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Selected stocks displayed recovery symptoms in today's market but many issues still were inclined to rest after their recent climb.

While individual spots of strength and weakness were in evidence at the close, minor gains and losses were about evenly divided. Numerous stocks were unchanged. Dealings were quiet throughout, transfers approximating 500,000 shares for the two hours.

A few steels, aircraft, utilities and specialties gave the best account of themselves. Motors, rails, oil, mail orders and coppers held to a narrowly uneven groove.

Further weakness of Lowe's was somewhat of a chilling influence on speculative sentiment.

## THOUSANDS CHEER AS EDENS LEAVE

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Anthony Eden, former British foreign secretary, was homebound today after a week's stay in the United States.

Before sailing on the Queen Mary, Eden said: "My wife and I have enjoyed every moment of our visit and we leave the United States with very deep regret. People in your country are very kind."

A crowd of several thousand cheered as Eden and his party boarded the vessel.

## WRIGHT HONORED FOR ORIGINAL HOP

DAYTON, O., Dec. 17.—(AP)—This aviation-minded city paid tribute today to one of its foremost native sons, Orville Wright, on the 35th anniversary of man's first successful airplane flight.

Featuring the celebration was a chamber of commerce dinner for Wright and his guest, Henry Ford, who formed his motor car company the year of Wright's Kitty Hawk, N.C., flight in an odd looking machine which he and his late brother, Wilbur, invented.

Ford has enshrined in his Dearborn, Mich., museum the Wright homestead and the Dayton bicycle shop where the original plane was developed.

The celebration interrupted Wright's customary routine of working ten hours daily in an unspontaneous laboratory.

## YELLOW RIVER ON RAMPAGE; FLOODS PERIL JAPANESE

SHANGHAI, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Now Yellow river floods inundating six districts of northern Kiangsu province were reported today in dispatches from the endangered area, approximately 400 miles northwest of Shanghai.

Flood waters were said to have breached river dykes near Kaiteng, Honan, and poured as far southward as Kiangsu's northernmost tip.

Meanwhile Chungking dispatches quoted the Chinese vice minister of air, General Chen Cheng, as estimating Japanese casualties at 270,000 men during Yangtze valley fighting from June through September. Of these 96,000 were killed in action.

Chen declared 30,000 Japanese soldiers had been sacrificed to gain 30 miles along the Anchang railway since the fall of Kiating July 26.

The Chinese official estimate in all 1,000,000 Japanese were at present engaged in fighting and garrisoning the already captured territory, 800,000 of them fighting in the Yangtze valley.

He asserted replacements soon would be a vital Japanese problem because of China's continued use of guerrilla tactics and because of increasing illness among Japanese soldiers, due to severe winter weather.

## CAPONE NEMESIS TO SEEK OFFICE

CHICAGO, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Dwight H. Green, the federal prosecutor who put Al Capone behind the bars, announced today he would seek the office of mayor of Chicago on the Republican ticket.

Green has the support of the Chicago Republican committee headed by Edward F. Moore, Cook county chairman, and a citizen group opposed to the candidacy of former Mayor William Hale Thompson.

Thompson announced his candidacy Tuesday night.

Green said: "I am according to the requests of thousands of liberal Republicans and independent Democrats, together with the elected officers of my party."

## FEDERAL GRANTS AND LOANS HELP SCHOOL BUILDING

ALBANY, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Oregon in the last four years has obtained buildings for the state institutions of higher education without using any educational tax funds though the building value is \$2,883,047. Governor Charles H. Marrs, was told by Willard L. Marks, president of the state board of higher education.

The letter, to accompany the biennial report of the board to the governor, reviews briefly the progress of the state system during the last two years, explains the financial requests being made for the coming biennium, mentions major administrative changes and reports on the success of the several institutions in educating the youth of the state.

Regarding the construction program President Marks points out that the facilities have been badly needed for several years but that the board's limited budget had to be used almost entirely for operation, leaving no funds for new buildings.

"It will be noted that this building program was financed almost entirely by federal grants and loans, and private gifts," President Marks wrote. "The loans are secured by the student building fees at the various institutions and are not obligations of the state of Oregon at all."

Range Feeding Gains  
PORTLAND, Dec. 17.—(AP)—A slight increase in the number of cattle on feed on Oregon range lands was shown today in a report of the U. S. department of agriculture, which estimated the total at 26,000 against 25,000 a year ago.

Okay Trade Pact  
MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Dec. 17.—(AP)—President Alfredo Baldomir today approved a trade agreement with Italy under which Italy agreed to buy 180,000,000 lire (\$9,000,000) of Uruguayan products in 1939. In comparison with 60,000,000 lire bought this year.
