A. P. CENTRAL OFFICE MOVED WITHOUT HALT IN FLOW OF REPORTS

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—(AP)—The vast leased wire system of the Associated Press operated from a new nerve center today—the new 15-story Associated Press building in Rockefeller Center.

The move from the Madison avenue building where the A.P.'s collection and distribution of news had centered since 1923 was accomplished during the early Sunday morning hours without a hitch and without an instant's delay in transmitting news to 1,350 newspapers over the association's 285,000 miles of leased wires.

The entire system operated from both the old and new headquarters for a time Sunday morning with teletype clicking in both places in unison.

Reporters and editors and photographers were on duty at both places. The wirephoto network was set up and ready for any news break. Men on duty at the old headquarters wrote and edited amid the organized confusion of the moving operation.
